Subject: Federal Receipts Reporting Requirement – Title 5 GCA, Ch. 4, § 4123(b)

As a reminder, per Title 5 GCA, Ch. 4, § 4123(b), all Government of Guam instrumentalities, with the exception of the Judicial and Legislative branches, are required to submit reports to the Bureau which contains a listing of *all* federal receipts (grants) received in the preceding fiscal year <u>as well as</u> "a plan(s) for operating the designated state agency, and its affected federal program(s) if there is a reduction in the federal receipts that the designated agency receives." Based on this requirement, department / agency reports of all 100% federal and federal matching grants-in-aid received in FY 2022 (October 1, 2021 through September 30, 2022) and operations plan(s) are due to the Bureau on November 1st, 2022.

The Improving Criminal Justice Responses Grant Program encourages government and courts to treat domestic violent sexual assault, and stalking as serious violations of criminal law requiring the coordinated involvement of the criminal justice system. The program supplements current efforts by increasing the number of certified sexual assault examiners, prosecution staff, and a legal advocate; purchase of proper forensic medical and investigative equipment; and provide appropriate training opportunities to help lessen the re-traumatization of victims and assist those in the criminal justice and achieve a higher conviction rate of perpetrators. Should there be a reduction in federal funding, program administration will be interrupted and crucial services such as those mentioned above will unfortunately be reduced or will no longer available to victims and survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault, dating violence, and stalking.
