Subject: Federal Receipts Reporting Requirement – Title 5 GCA, Ch. 4, § 4123(b)

As a reminder, per Title 5 GCA, Ch. 4, § 4123(b), all Government of Guam instrumentalities, with the exception of the Judicial and Legislative branches, are required to submit reports to the Bureau which contains a listing of *all* federal receipts (grants) received in the preceding fiscal year <u>as well as</u> "a plan(s) for operating the designated state agency, and its affected federal program(s) if there is a reduction in the federal receipts that the designated agency receives." Based on this requirement, department / agency reports of all 100% federal and federal matching grants-in-aid received in FY 2023 (October 1, 2022 through September 30, 2023) and operation plan(s) are due to the Bureau on or before November 1, 2023.
