Håfa Adai Madam Speaker and Members of the 37th Guam Legislature,

The Leon Guerrero-Tenorio Administration hereby formally submits for your review and consideration the Fiscal Year (FY) 2025 Proposed Comprehensive Program and Financial Plan, also known as the Executive Budget Request (EBR), for the Government of Guam.

Guam's economy is expected to continue its expansion following two major events, the Pandemic and Typhoon Mawar. Economic activity will continue to expand as a result of the federal construction, notably the Camp Blaz Marine Corps Base, missile defense construction along with private and government construction projects. The Village of Donki will open this calendar year and we can expect to see the expansion of existing businesses like the new McDonalds in Mangilao and the new Jollibee in our island's Capital. The University of Guam will soon see a new School of Engineering and a new Student Services Center, and the Guam Veterans Cemetery will soon see significant improvements to its Chapel and a new administration building.

We note that as we transmit the EBR, COPE NORTH 2024 is currently underway and this lengthy multi-nation military exercise is filling our hotel rooms and restaurants. As a result of this expansion in our private sector we may see unemployment remain, or potentially further fall below the latest report of 4.1%.

Fiscal Responsibility and a heartfelt desire to address the needs of the People of Guam has resulted in Our Administrations FY 2025 EBR continuing the Gas Tax Relief for the entirety of FY 2025. We have crafted a spending plan which not only assists all residents of Guam with continued relief at the gas pump, the FY 2025 EBR takes into account a federal mandate from the Federal Aviation Administration that requires Guam to remit to the A.B. Won Pat International Airport Authority fuel taxes collected in excess of \$0.04.

We continue to do more for the People of Guam despite not having these traditional sources of revenue. Examples of this include:

- # 20 recruitments in progress for the Department of Public Works, despite the continuation of the Gas Tax Relief
- # 25 recruitments in progress and 20 new Corrections Officers Recruits in FY 2025, with additional funding for supplies
- # 23 recruitments in progress for Police Officer Trainees, promotions for Police Officer II's, III's Sergeants, Sergeant II and a Police Colonel for our Guam Police Department
- # 30 recruitments in progress and 20 new Firefighter Recruits in FY 2025
- # Promotions for existing Customs Officer Trainees as well as 10 new Customs Officer Trainees for our Customs and Quarantine Agency.
- # The Guam Behavioral Health and Wellness Center will receive a \$2.6M increase for personnel expenses

The Guam Memorial Hospital Authority (GMHA) will receive nearly \$1.6M in additional Pharmaceutical Funding as a result of our proposed increase in the Business Privilege Tax collections in FY 2025

As a result of the increase in our Tourist Attraction Fund collections anticipated in FY 2025, the Department of Parks and Recreation will receive funding for the existing 8 Park Rangers, 3 Park Rangers Recruits currently in progress and 7 Park Ranger Recruits in FY 2025

The Bureau of Planning and Statistics will receive funding for a new Chief Planner Statistician Tech positions

The Department of Agriculture will see the addition of 4 new Animal Control Officers and 3 additional Conservation Officers

All existing Government of Guam personnel under our preview are funded in our FY 2025 EBR in addition to the above-mentioned increase in personnel for public safety, funding for behavioral health, funding for GMHA, funding for Public Works and continued relief at the fuel pump.

Two weeks ago, I, along with members of my Fiscal Team met with Moody's Investor Services (Moody's) who rates our Business Privilege Tax Bonds, our Tourist Attraction Bonds and our overall General Fund Credit worthiness. I am very pleased to report that for the first time in 22 years, the Government of Guam's General Obligation Credit Rating is now Investment Grade.

This is a momentous event in Guam's history. Having Moody's increase our General Obligation Bond rating is a testament to the Leon Guerrero-Tenorio Administration's sustained commitment to Fiscal Responsibility while still providing relief to our residents. We have liquidity and we commend the legislature for continually authorizing more money annually into the Rainy Day Fund. Moody's was also impressed with the soon to be launched new Financial Management System which will replace the legacy AS400, funding for the third year of this contract is contained in the FY 2025 EBR.

We pay income tax returns within 3 weeks, which was previously unheard of. In FY 2024 we launched the Inaugural Fully Self Insured Medical, Dental and Pharmaceutical program for the employees and dependents of the Government of Guam. We now have a First Ever, Nationally Accredited Locally Certified Paramedic program at the Guam Fire Department. Finally, we have begun work on the seawall as a first step in the realization of a New Fisherman's Coop.

Senators, we are making significant progress and must stay the course. We have a new hospital to build and schools to repair or replace and we, together, can accomplish these needed and truly necessary improvements in education and health care if we work together. We look forward to meeting and discussing this spending plan for FY 2025. Thank you.

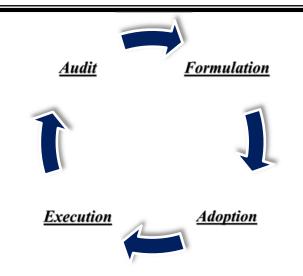

THE BUDGET PROCESS

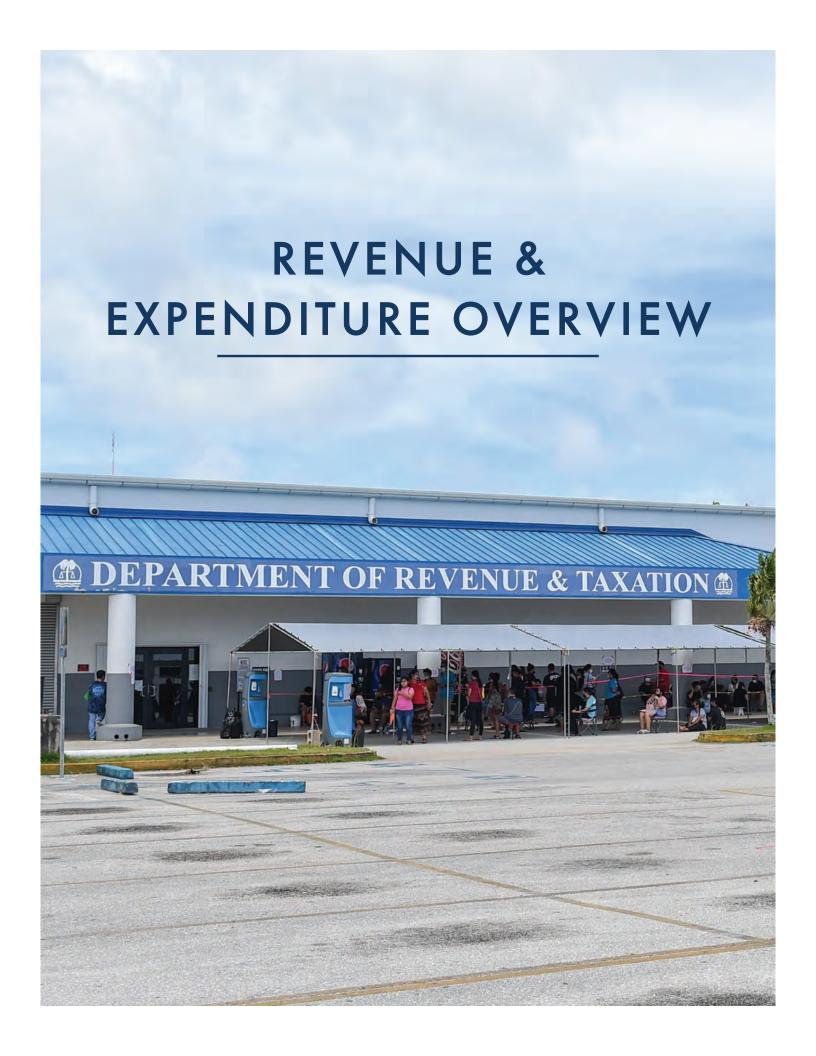
Pursuant to §4103 and §4106 of Title 5 GCA, the Governor of Guam is required to prepare and administer the Executive Budget for the Government of Guam on an annual basis. The Executive Budget represents the Governor's financial proposal with recommended priorities for allocating resources. The budget process is essential and necessary for the enactment of a budget and a review of government operations. The Budget Process for Fiscal Year 2025 is comprised of the following phases: 1) Formulation, 2) Adoption, 3) Execution, and 4) Audit.

- 1) During the Formulation phase, the economic forecast and the program and financial plans are prepared for the various departments. Economic data and statistics are utilized in developing projected revenues for the upcoming fiscal year. A budget call is then distributed to all executive line departments and agencies once revenues have been projected. The Bureau of Budget Management Research (BBMR) will issue guidelines to the departments and agencies in the development of their respective budgets. As mandated by law, the Executive Budget Request is due to the Legislature no later than January 31st of the current fiscal year. The exception would be if the Governor is in his or her first year of the first term in office or an additional non-consecutive term whereby the Executive Budget Request is due no later than April 8th of that same year.
- 3) The Execution phase involves the management of funds appropriated per the General Appropriations Act. Each department prepares its allotment of appropriations and may request revisions, legislative or administrative transfers, or supplemental appropriations throughout the fiscal year. BBMR must approve such allotment revisions. The Bureau also monitors and assists in carrying out the approved budget in line with established policies of the Governor.



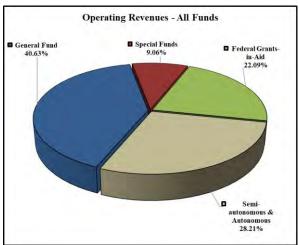
- 2) In the Adoption phase, the Legislature considers the Governor's proposal and passes the overall revenue and spending plan in the form of a General Appropriations Bill. The Bill normally receives more detailed hearings within the auspices of the applicable legislative committees. Customarily, a series of hearings are called by the Committee on General Government Operations and Appropriations, to allow department heads and staff to present an overview of the Governor's proposed budget, relative to their departments and agencies appropriation requirement. mandated by law, the Legislature must pass a General Appropriations Bill no later than August 31st of the current fiscal year. The Bill is then transmitted to the Governor for consideration and approval after which it becomes public law. Other bills may be introduced for enactment into law to include budget amendments during the fiscal year.
- 4) The Audit phase consists of the evaluation of all departments and agencies financial performance at year-end to ensure compliance with applicable laws and regulations. During the audit phase, financial transactions and accounts are reconciled. Reports are then assessed and analyzed to improve accountability, efficiency, and effectiveness in the achievement of goals and objectives. Moreover, the audit phase ensures the best economic use of resources to enhance the quality of public service.

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REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE OVERVIEW

The Government of Guam's operating revenues are composed of four classifications: General Fund, Special Funds, Federal Grant-in-Aid, and Semi-autonomous and Autonomous Agencies Operating Funds.



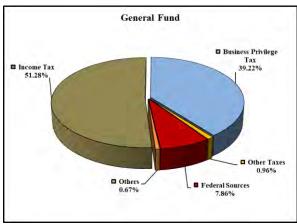

General Fund

The General Fund is the fund into which all government revenues, not otherwise restricted by statute, are deposited and from which appropriations are made. The Government of Guam is the only taxing authority and there are no separate municipal, county, school district or improvement district taxes.

The three primary sources of General Fund revenues are Income Taxes, Business Privilege Taxes, also known as gross receipt tax (GRT), and Federal Sources. Income taxes account for 51.28% and Business privilege taxes for approximately 39.22% of total General Fund revenues. Under the Organic Act, Guam's Income Tax Code mirrors the United States Internal Revenue Code. As a result, the income tax laws in force in the United States are applied to the residents of the Island, however, payable to the Treasury of Guam. Gross receipts taxes

are levied on a broad base of goods and services, including the sale of tangible personal property and the provision of professional service. Federal Sources include Section 30 funds. Section 30 of the Organic Act of Guam requires that all customs duties and federal income taxes, quarantine, passport, immigration, and naturalization fees collected on Guam shall be covered into the Treasurer of Guam. These include federal income taxes from military personnel based on-island or who consider Guam as their state of legal residence.

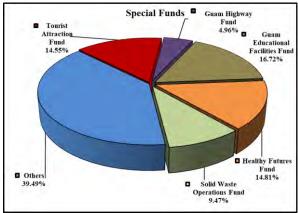

Special Revenue Funds

Special Revenue Funds are created by statute or Executive Order with an identified source of revenue or appropriation. Expenditures from such funds are restricted to purposes set by statute or as sources for debt service payment for bonds issued for constructing improving major facilities and and infrastructures. Several of the significant Special Revenue Funds include the Tourist Attraction Fund, Guam Highway Fund, Guam Educational Facilities Fund, Healthy Futures Fund, and the Solid Waste Operations Fund.

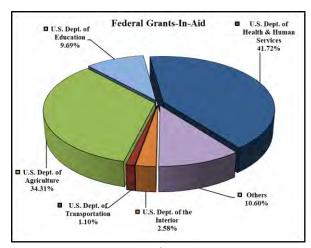
REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE OVERVIEW

Federal Grants-in-Aid

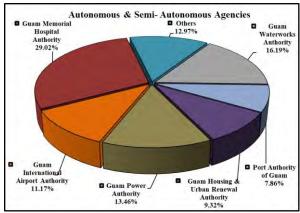
Federal Grants-in-Aid are funds received by the Government for public service delivery, either for specific programs or for general purpose aid. Federal Grant funds, which may require local matching funds, are requested through various federal agencies and are spent according to the terms and conditions approved by the respective federal grantor agency. Major federal grantor agencies include the United States Department of Education, Health and Human Services, Interior, Transportation, and Agriculture.

Semi-autonomous and Autonomous Agencies Operating Fund

These funds are financed and operated in a manner similar to a private business enterprise where the cost of providing services to the public on a continuing basis is financed or recovered primarily through user charges. Autonomous agencies such as the Guam Power Authority, Guam International Airport Authority, and Guam Waterworks Authority generate revenues operational and capital requirements. Other agencies, such as the Guam Visitor's Bureau, University of Guam and Guam Community College, require subsidies from the General Fund and other external sources to meet their operational requirements. Most autonomous agencies prepare for their Fiscal Year 2025 budgets between the months of April through June. Listed below are operational budget amounts from various autonomous and semiautonomous agencies for FY 2024.



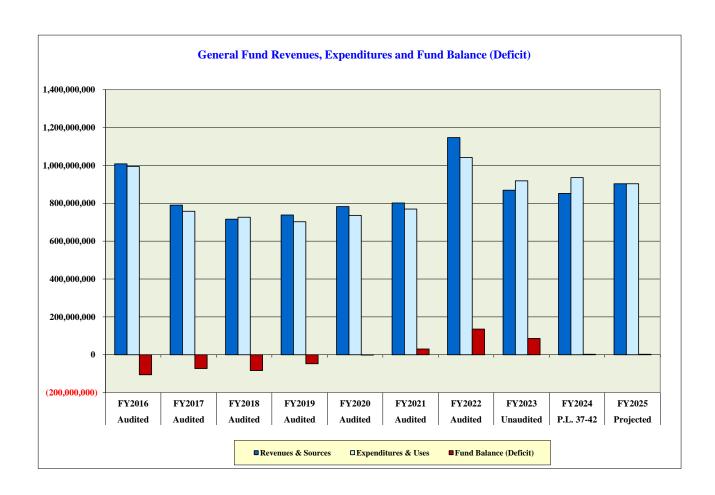

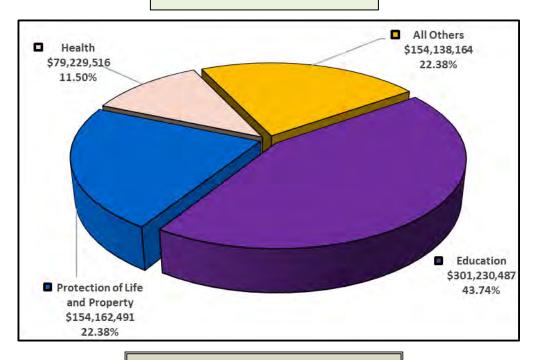

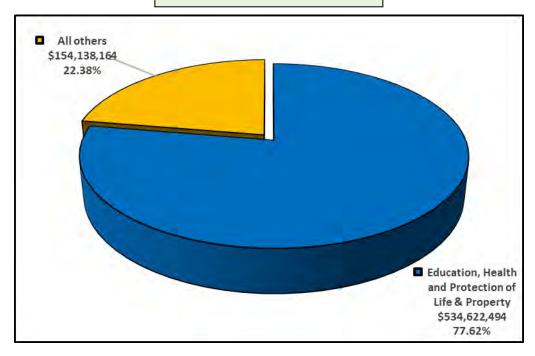
Allocation to Education, Health and Protection of Life & Property vs. All Other Service Areas

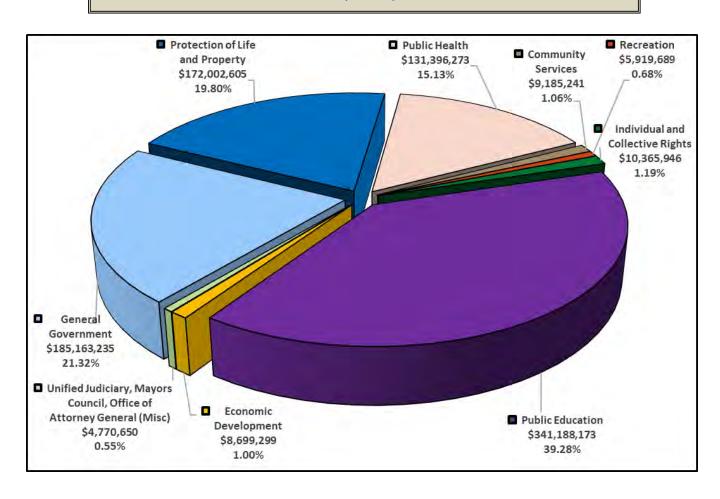
Allocation By Key Service Area

FY 2025 GENERAL FUND & SPECIAL FUND ALLOCATION

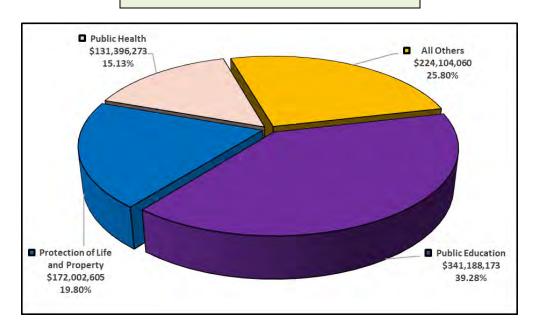
Total General Fund & Special Fund Allocation (Executive Branch): \$868,691,111



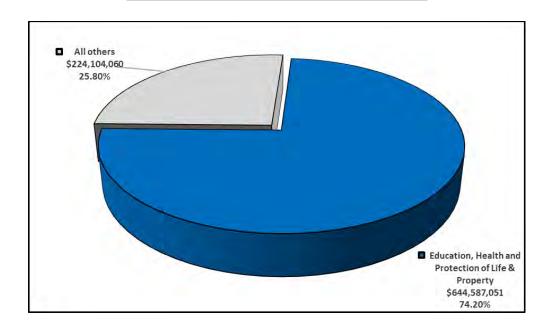
FY 2025 GENERAL FUND & SPECIAL FUND ALLOCATION

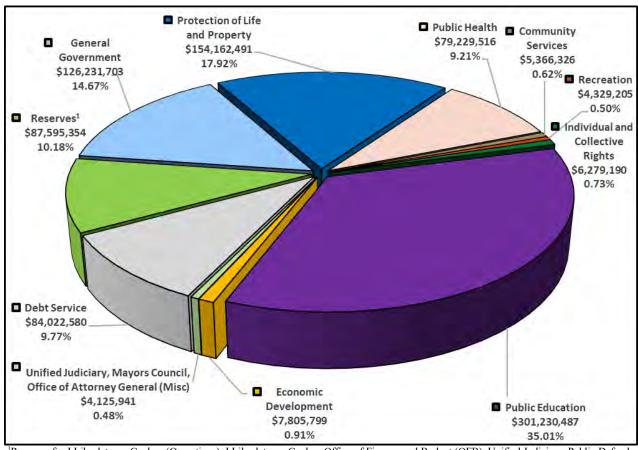

FY 2025 GENERAL FUND ALLOCATION

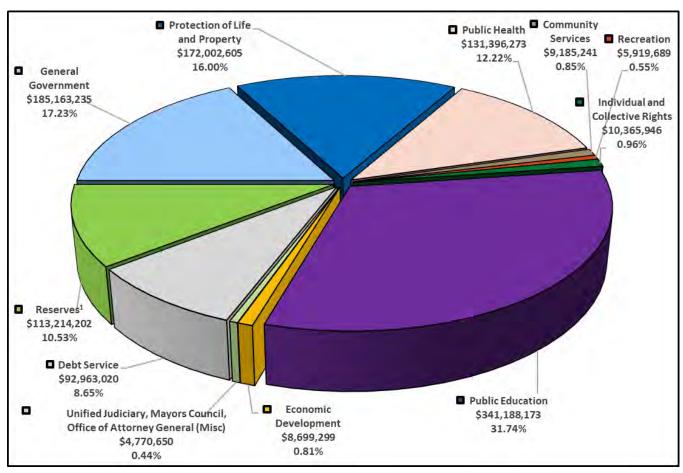
General Fund Allocation (Executive Branch and Reserves¹) \$860,378,592

ECONOMIC OUTLOOK



Economic Outlook for Guam Fiscal Year 2025

SUMMARY

Guam's economy is expected to continue expanding and recovering from the Pandemic downturn throughout Fiscal Years 2024 and 2025. This economic expansion and partial recovery began in 2021 and 2022, restoring Guam's growth trend. Further, increased Economic activity is anticipated due to simultaneous increases in construction including the progression of the Camp Blaz Marine Corps base construction activity nearing its planned peak, missile defense construction, private and Government construction projects, and continued recovery in the tourism sector from Korea and Japan.

The three primary sources of fund inflows to Guam are tourism, federal expenditures, and construction capital investment. Tourism has begun a partial rebound from the pandemic virtual shutdown in March 2020, continuing into 2022. There is a solid upside for an increased tourism forecast with a little downside. Federal expenditures will likely remain well above recent levels due to the Marine Corps base projects and increased non-defense appropriation levels in general and for Guam specifically. Construction is almost certain to increase substantially; that is supported by private, Government of Guam, and Federal projects already contracted, increasing appropriation levels, workload backlogs, and eased federal restrictions on imported workers to meet the demand. Guam's location in the Pacific will continue to provide a fundamental advantage for defense and support the long-term trend of tourism expansion.

As always, a myriad of uncertainties regarding global health developments, economic or political issues, military conflicts, and potential natural disasters could enhance or impair the anticipated continued growth scenario.

This outlook focuses on identifying and providing measures of the significant economic factors influencing revenues in preparation for the Government of Guam's Executive Branch annual budget.

Increased tax revenues in Guam in 2022 and 2023 were in part due to increased economic activity and, in part, a spike in price levels. Price inflation led to wage inflation, increasing payroll income tax collections, and Business Privilege Tax Collections. As inflation rates decline, growth in Government revenues will be less influenced by higher price levels. The shift in industry activity from tourism to construction will also cause a change in tax collections. There are fewer resident employees in the tourism industry and more non-resident employees in the Construction industry. The non-resident workers are subject to higher income tax rates; however, a substantial portion of their wage income is repatriated, resulting in a lower expenditure multiplier than resident employees, who spend a more significant portion of their income on Guam. The income brackets for the increasingly higher rates for higher incomes will be increased with the Federal Income tax withholding tables for 2024 resulting in reduced collections for a given wage income. The reduced withholdings will, on the other hand, provide additional disposable income.

Other factors, such as changes in tax rates and timing of the receipt of various payments, may also have measurable impacts on realized revenue during the fiscal year. The global, national, and regional economic environment is reviewed as Guam's economy functions and is influenced by myriad interrelated influences.

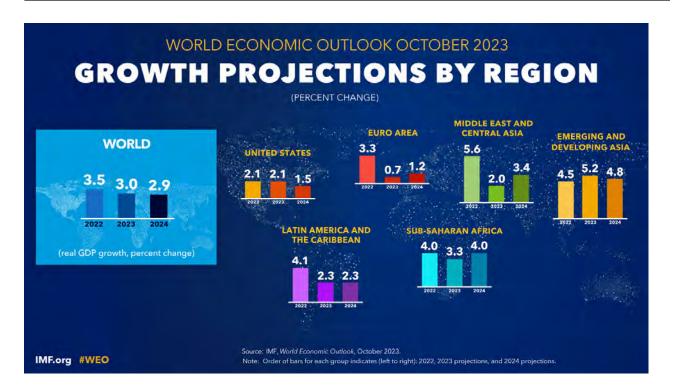

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The global recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic and Russia's invasion of Ukraine remains slow and uneven. Despite economic resilience earlier this year, with a reopening rebound and progress in reducing inflation from last year's peaks, it is too soon to take comfort. Economic activity still falls short of its pre-pandemic path, especially in emerging markets and developing economies, and there are widening divergences among regions. Several forces are holding back the recovery. Some reflect the long-term consequences of the pandemic, the war in Ukraine, and increasing geo-economic fragmentation. Others are more cyclical in nature, including the effects of monetary policy tightening necessary to reduce inflation, withdrawal of fiscal support amid high debt, and extreme weather events.

Global growth is forecast to slow from 3.5 percent in 2022 to 3.0 percent in 2023 and 2.9 percent in 2024. The projections remain below the historical (2000–19) average of 3.8 percent, and the forecast for 2024 is down by 0.1 percentage point from the July 2023 Update to the World Economic Outlook. For advanced economies, the expected slowdown is from 2.6 percent in 2022 to 1.5 percent in 2023 and 1.4 percent in 2024, amid stronger-than-expected US momentum but weaker-than-expected growth in the euro area. Emerging market and developing economies are projected to have growth modestly decline, from 4.1 percent in 2022 to 4.0 percent in both 2023 and 2024, with a down-ward revision of 0.1 percentage point in 2024, reflecting the property sector crisis in China. Forecasts for global growth over the medium term, at 3.1 percent, are at their lowest in decades, and prospects for countries to catch up to higher living standards are weak. Global inflation is forecast to decline steadily, from 8.7 percent in 2022 to 6.9 percent in 2023 and 5.8 percent in 2024. But the forecasts for 2023 and 2024 are revised up by 0.1 percentage point and 0.6 percentage point, respectively, and inflation is not expected to return to target until 2025 in most cases.

Risks to the outlook are more balanced than they were six months ago, on account of the resolution of US debt ceiling tensions and Swiss and US authorities' having acted decisively to contain financial turbulence. The likelihood of a hard landing has receded, but the balance of risks to global growth remains tilted to the downside. China's property sector crisis could deepen, with global spillovers, particularly for commodity exporters. Elsewhere, as Chapter 2 explains, near-term inflation expectations have risen and could contribute—along with tight labor markets—to core inflation pressures persisting and requiring higher policy rates than expected. More climate and geopolitical shocks could cause additional food and energy price spikes. As Chapter 3 explains, intensifying geo-economic fragmentation could constrain the flow of commodities across markets, causing additional price volatility and complicating the green transition. Amid rising debt-service costs, more than half of low-income developing countries are in or at high risk of debt distress.

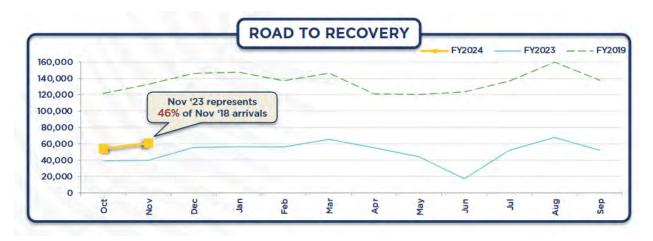

Tourism

Tourism expenditures represented the largest share of the sources of funds flowing into the Guam economy pre-pandemic. Tourism expenditures impact revenue and employment primarily in sectors that tourism supports, including transportation, services, retail trade, and indirect effects economy wide. International travel and tourism in Guam are far more greatly affected than most larger economies, as Guam has a large component of its economy related to international tourism.

The resumption of significant international travel began with the easing of government travel and quarantine requirements in both the origin and destinations for travel. The history of Japanese tourist arrivals shows a pattern of repeated recovery after downturns due to natural or other adverse events. The pace of such a recovery has been considerable in the short time since Korea and Japan's travel restrictions were eased. Effective October 11, 2022, Japan began to allow entry of visa-free independent tourists and abolished the daily arrival cap. All travelers entering South Korea are no longer subject to quarantine, regardless of vaccination status (as of June 8, 2022). COVID-19 testing is no longer required before departure (as of September 3, 2022). Visitor arrivals from Korea were fewer than two percent of pre-pandemic levels as of March 2022; only nine months later, in December 2022, their arrivals increased dramatically and exceeded fifty percent of pre-pandemic levels for the respective months. Visitors from Japan were fewer than three percent of pre-pandemic levels in June 2022 and expanded to nearly nine percent over the six months ending in December 2022.

Continuing recovery has involved restoring flight schedules and reopening hotels, shops, restaurants, and attractions as demand further rebounds.

Chart 1 shows the total number of visitors to Guam and the Occupancy tax collections by year.

The Guam Visitors Bureau's Road to Recovery chart above and the December 2023 arrivals chart show visitor arrivals continuing to increase in fiscal year 2023 and the first quarter of fiscal year 2024. The Bureau's arrival forecast for fiscal year 2024 below shows expected increases during the coming year, likely continuing through 2025 and beyond.

Construction projects proceed through several phases: planning, funding, contracting or permitting, and construction and payment. Statistics are provided for the funding, often appropriations, bond or private financing, and contracting and permitting. Funding authorizations provide an advance indicator of upcoming construction while building permits and contracts provide a more immediate leading indicator of construction that will likely commence soon. Employment reflects current construction activity. Expenditures reflect payments for construction work that has been completed. Figures on these items reflect the stages of the construction activity and are included in this report.

Construction is expected to increase substantially from FY 2023 in FY 2024 and FY 2025. The recent acceleration of construction activity was substantial in FY 2023. Construction activity has increased dramatically through FY 2023 as measured by employment, H2 workers, and gross receipts. Construction employment increased from 7,860 in September 2020 to 12,080 in September 2023. H2

workers increased from 1,527 in December 2020 to 5,065 in December 2023. As a measure of construction activity, Gross receipt taxes paid for construction increased from \$48.2 million in FY 2020 to \$70.7 million for FY 2023, an increase of 47% in three years.

Construction is expected to increase substantially from FY 2023 in FY 2024 and FY 2025. The recent acceleration of construction activity was substantial in FY 2023. Construction activity has increased dramatically through FY 2023 as measured by employment, H2 workers, and gross receipts. Construction employment increased from 7,860 in September 2020 to 12,080 in September 2023. H2 workers increased from 1,527 in December 2020 to 5,065 in December 2023. As a measure of construction activity, Gross receipt taxes paid for construction increased from \$48.2 million in FY 2020 to \$70.7 million for FY 2023, an increase of 47% in three years.

The total value of building permits for civilian projects and Department of Defense (DOD) construction contracts increased substantially in 2021 through 2022 compared to prior years (Chart 2). High levels of previously permitted and contracted projects are underway. Building permits and DOD construction contracts are solid indicators of plans backed by financial commitments to commence construction soon.

Federal appropriations for military construction projects, Government of Guam bond or other financing commitments, and announcements of private sector projects are strong indicators of future construction. Federal DOD construction appropriations have increased from \$248.7 million in FY 2017 to \$523.0 million in FY 2023 and just over \$1.0 Billion in FY 2024. (Chart 3). The list of DOD projects currently under construction is also substantial at over \$2.2 billion project cost, with over \$1.1 billion in work remaining to be completed (Chart 4).

Several major civilian projects are ongoing. These include:

- Japanese retail store Don Quijote is planning to open a sizeable retail discount store known as Don Donki. The property lease was registered at the Guam Department of Land Management on March 20, 2019, at a lot near the corner of Airport Road and Marine Corps Drive, which the Triple J Auto Group occupied. As of January 2023, construction is well underway. Don Don Donki is affiliated with Don Quijote, Japan's biggest discount store. The Guam location's retail space will be about 160,000 square feet, with grocery sales and a food court with in-house restaurants. The retail store plans to open later in 2024; employee recruitment activities including a job fair have taken place in January 2024.
- Infrastructure projects for Guam's roads, drinking water system, and internet access
 has been provided for in the \$193 million federal \$1.2 trillion bipartisan infrastructure
 law. A release from Congressman San Nicolas indicated that "Guam can expect a
 permanent 2.5 times the annual increase in our highway funds to \$45 million and
 access to billions in public transportation grants, and grants to expand and harden our
 broadband and water infrastructure."

MOODY'S UPGRADES GOVERNMENT OF GUAM BONDS TO INVESTMENT GRADE

The January 26, 2024 press release states:

Moody's Investor Service to upgrade the Government of Guam's issuer rating to an investment grade rate of Baa3 from Ba1 with a Stable outlook.

This upgrade to investment grade Baa3 with a positive outlook applies to the GovGuam General Obligation (GO) bonds, Hotel Occupancy Tax (HOT) bonds, and the Business Privilege Tax (BPT) bonds. Moody's also upgraded the GovGuam Certificates of Participation (COP) rating to Ba1 from Ba2. An investment grade rating for the government means Guam will now see even lower bond financing interest rates for future issues as additional investors—who can only purchase investment grade bonds—will now be able to participate and compete for Government of Guam bonds.

"This is a tremendous accomplishment for the Government of Guam as it has been 22 years since it had been rated as an investment grade rating," said Governor Leon Guerrero.

The release by Moody's attributes the upgrade to "the significant improvement in the government's financial position bolstered by federal government support and substantial military construction activity, despite depressed tourism levels."

GOVERNMENT OF GUAM FY 2022 SSBCI FUNDING, 2023& 2024 INITIATIVES (Provided by the Guam Economic Development Authority)

State Small Business Credit Initiative (SSBCI) - \$58.2 Million allocated for Guam

The American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 reauthorizes and expands the State Small Business Credit Initiative (SSBCI) Program, which was originally established in 2010. SSBCI will provide a combined \$10 billion to states, the District of Columbia, territories, and Tribal governments to expand access to capital for small businesses emerging from the pandemic, build ecosystems of opportunity and entrepreneurship, and create high-quality jobs.

Guam, approved for up to \$58.6 million in December 2022, will operate three programs: a \$36 million loan guarantee program, a \$12.4 million collateral support program, and a \$10 million venture capital program. The first two programs are designed to incentivize lenders to make loans to borrowers. The equity/venture capital program will provide seed, early and growth stage equity investment in Guambased startups.

GEDA Venture Capital Program funded by SSBCI Grant Funds

GEDA's PFD Division has been developing the corporate documents and forms to establish the first ever venture Capital Corporation, to be named the *Destinu Guahan Fund (DG Fund)*. The State Small

Business Credit Initiative (SSBCI) is a \$1.5 billion federal program administered by the U.S. Department of Treasury to strengthen state programs that provide access to capital. GEDA has received initial approval of \$56 million to fund various programs to assist Guam in its economic recovery. In discussions with the US Treasury, and in light that this will be our first venture capital program, initial funding for the program will start at Ten Million dollars (\$10,000,000.00) to assist startups and early state businesses especially in the field of agriculture, technology, medical and shipping. Should we need additional funding, we have the ability to amend the application for additional funding.

Guam Department of Corrections Leaseback Financing

The 36th Guam Legislature passed legislation, now Public Law 36-57 that pledges Five Million Dollars (\$5,000,000.00) as an annual lease payment for the construction of a new and modernized Correctional Facility for up to thirty (30) years. The law further states that the first payment in FY2022 will come from the Federal reimbursement of the Earned Income Tax Credit with the following years payments to come from the General Fund. After all preliminary architectural and engineering studies are complete; GEDA expects to issue an RFP for a developer in FY 2023.

Guam Healthcare Campus Leaseback Financing

The 36th Guam Legislature passed legislation, now Public Law 36-56 that pledges Thirty-Five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000.00) as an annual lease payment for the new Healthcare Facility for up to forty (40) years. The law further states that the first payment in FY 2022 will come from the Federal reimbursement of the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) with the following year's payments to come from the General Fund.

- 2 yr. CAPI approximately \$531,084,038 PAR \$34 million DS
- 3 yr. CAPI approximately \$521,557,026 PAR \$34 million DS

Simon Sanchez High School Leaseback Financing

P.L. 31-229, 32-120, 32-121 and 36-107 authorized the financing for the rehabilitation, construction, expansion and renovation of the Simon Sanchez High School. As part of the Government of Guam FY 2023 Appropriations act, the program now includes key amendments that will move this project forward to include the following:

- 1. Authorizes GEDA to issue Lease Revenue Bonds in an aggregate principal amount of \$166.4 million to finance the design, renovation or construction and maintenance of the SSHS facility, with a max term of thirty (30) years and at a max interest rate of 7.50%;
- 2. Identifies the funding source for rental payments as any lawfully available moneys of the government of Guam; and
- 3. Establishes a maximum \$16.4 million per year to cover annual rental payments to include, but is not limited to, debt service, insurance and maintenance costs and GEDA expenses).

Department of Land Management (DLM)

P.L. 29-135 authorized the financing for a new Land Resources Public Facility and for the purchase of collateral equipment in an amount not to exceed \$15.75 million. The Land Resources Building Public Facility will house the DLM, Chamorro Land Trust Commission, Guam Ancestral Lands Commission and Hagåtña Restoration and Redevelopment Authority. The subject site will be situated along West O'Brien Drive, between Father Duenas Avenue and Padre Palomo Street (vacant land across the Julale Center in Hagåtña).

Department of Public Works (DPW)

Public Law 31-233 authorizes the issuance of GARVEE bonds not to exceed the amount of \$75 million for the purpose of implementing the capital improvement highway projects identified in the 2030 Guam Transportation Plan to improve Guam's highway infrastructure. DPW has been working to clear title issues.

- Second phase of the Route 17 Cross Island Road project with an estimated construction amount of \$35 million
- Awaiting confirmation to include partial of Route 15 to the financing.

MARINE CORPS RELOCATION

The effect of the ongoing Marine Corps Relocation projects on Guam's economy in FY 2025 will primarily be associated with substantial increases in construction activity. Despite the acceleration in construction, delays related to labor shortages, the pandemic, and other causes, the realignment of forces to Guam was extended again to FY 2028, as noted in the Inspector General's Realignment report covering FY 2020. Those increases and impacts on the economy are interrelated and discussed in this report's construction and federal expenditures sections. This section focuses on realignment issues specifically.

The Record of Decision released in August 2015 substantially downsized and lengthened the time frame from the initial 2010 plan. The realignment cost is capped at \$8.7 billion, of which about \$3 billion will come from the Government of Japan. The plans were to relocate about 5,000 Marines and their dependents from Okinawa to Guam between 2020 and 2025. Delays to the plan continue. Marine Corps Base Camp Blaz will be home to approximately 5,000 Marines from III Marine Expeditionary Force who will begin relocating from Okinawa, Japan, by FY 2025, according to the December 21, 2021, Guam Realignment Report. The plan is summarized in an August 18, 2017, Pacific Daily News article. It includes "a Marine base on a military property at Naval Computer and Telecommunications Station; housing Marine families in homes to be built within the fence at Andersen; developing a live-fire training range complex on 338 acres of land at Andersen, adjacent to the wildlife refuge at Ritidian; and developing a hand-grenade training facility at Andersen South." It also includes many off-base infrastructure capital improvements. These include civilian water and wastewater projects, port projects, road improvements for Route 1, 3, and 11, and Agana bridge projects.

Public Law 111-84, "National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) for Fiscal Year 2010," section 2835, October 28, 2009, designates the DoD Inspector General as the chairperson of the Interagency Coordination Group of Inspectors General for Guam Realignment. It requires an annual report due February 1 of each year. Sec. 2851 of the Fiscal Year 2021 NDAA changed the reporting requirement from annual to biennial, with the next report for FY2023 due February 1, 2024, and every second February 1 thereafter.

The Interagency Coordination Group of Inspectors General's Report for Guam Realignment Annual Report published January 27, 2022, contains five sections that identify the programs and operations funded with appropriated amounts or funds otherwise made available for military construction on Guam in FY 2021. These sections reported that:

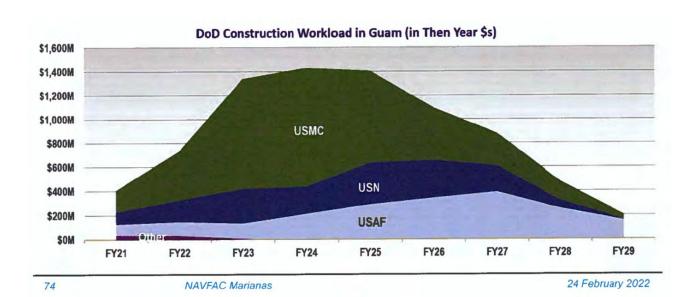
- 1. The DoD obligated \$1.4 billion and expended \$448.3 million. Other Federal agencies obligated \$8.8 million and expended \$1.9 million. (Section 1)
- 2. The DoD identified 270 military construction projects and programs, totaling \$447 million, with estimated completion costs of \$1.9 billion. Other Federal agencies identified thirty-eight projects and programs that were directly associated with the realignment. Of the thirty-eight projects and programs, two projects and programs had incurred costs of \$335,249 and three projects and programs had estimated completion costs of \$9.4 million. (Section 2)
- 3. The Government of Japan provided revenues of \$401.9 million and earned \$26 million in interest associated with revenues. Also, the Government of Japan obligated \$918.9 million and expended \$268.6 million. (Section 3)
- 4. The DoD identified operating expenses of \$115.2 million. Other Federal agencies identified operating expenses of \$78,187. (Section 4)
- 5. The DoD identified a total of 222 contracts, grants, agreements, or other funding mechanisms, with obligations of \$1.2 billion. Other Federal agencies identified a total of thirty-five contracts, grants, agreements, or other funding mechanisms, with obligations of \$7.3 million. (Section 5)

In FY 2017, DOD obligated \$417.9 million and expended \$152.7 million. For FY 2017 and FY 2018 combined, obligations exceeded expenditures by \$452.1 million. That excess of new obligations further increased in FY 2019 as there were obligations of \$309.4 million and expenditures of \$210.3 million. The excess of obligations over expenditures increased again in FY 2020 by \$164.2 million with obligations of \$529.3 million and expenditures of \$365.1 million. In FY 2021, DOD obligated \$1.4 billion and expended \$448.3 million, an excess of obligations over expenditures of \$951.7 million. The five-year accumulation of obligated funds available to disperse as work progresses is \$1.67 billion. The combined appropriations totaling over \$1.3 billion for FY 2022 and FY 2023 add to the available funding. This indicates that a substantial amount of work to be contracted and inprocess has accumulated and will almost certainly substantially accelerate the pace of realignment-related construction activity. The expenditures have increased from \$152.7 million in FY2017 to \$448.3 billion in FY2021.

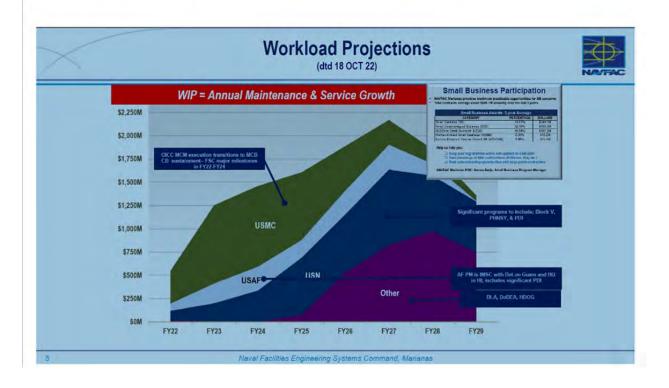
The report shows the total relocation project cost from inception to September 30, 2021 including costs incurred by DOD, other federal agencies and the Government of Japan at \$2.6 billion, about Thirty percent of the \$8.7 billion project cost. Chart 4 details ongoing projects totaling over \$1.1 billion and the value of remaining work. Chart 5 details projects that will be solicited for award in 2023 and 2024 which total \$410.8 million.

FY 2025 includes an appropriation of \$238 million for military construction for the missile defense system in addition to the Marine Corps base project shown in DOD Table two.

The following two DOD workload charts show dramatically increasing construction amounts which include US Marine Corps, Navy and Air Force projects. The second chart shows increasing maintenance and service workloads.

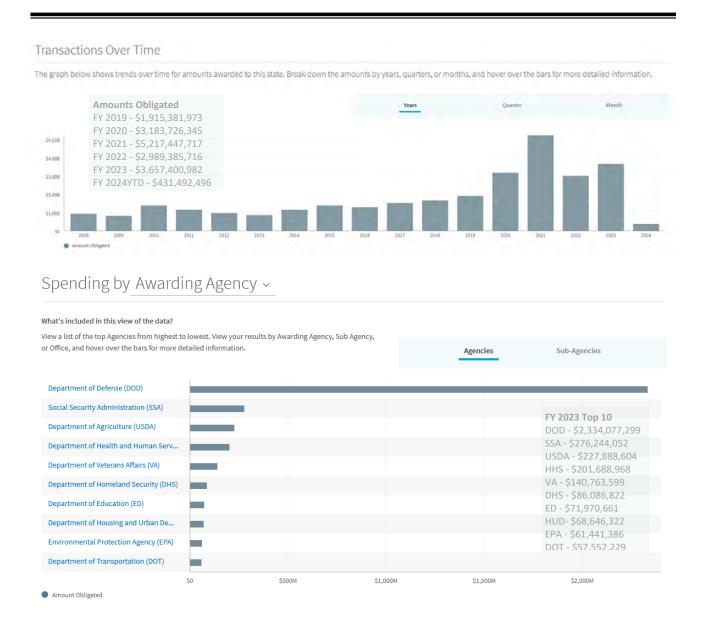

Federal Government Expenditures

Federal government expenditures now represent the largest source of funds flowing to Guam. Federal government expenditures in recent years were the second-largest source of funds, well behind tourism expenditures in recent years. The pandemic induced reduction in tourism, and an increase in Federal expenditures changed that. To provide perspective to the federal expenditures as a component of the economy, the total value of sales or revenue reported on Guam in the 2017 Economic Census was \$8.47 billion. The Gross Domestic Product in 2021 was \$6.1 billion.

Continuation of the full reimbursement of Government of Guam annual costs tied to the Earned Income Tax Credit and the Childcare Tax Credit, which has averaged \$53 million and \$28 million per year since 2017 will also provide continue to provide a boost to Government of Guam federal receipts and budgetary relief for the general fund.



The President will propose the Federal FY 2025 budget later in 2024, so the federal expenditure plan and amounts are yet to be available. The FY 2024 budget has not been passed except for the NDAA, and the federal Government is operating under a continuing resolution. This and the following items provide evidence that federal spending will continue to increase in the U.S. and Guam in 2024 and 2025.

A substantial component of federal expenditures in Guam is for non-discretionary payments, including Social Security and Federal Pensions. Those programs are committed to having increases effective January 1, 2024, which set the floor to continue these higher payment amounts in 2025 and will likely increase further with next year's adjustments. Federal General Schedule civilian employees will receive a 4.7% increase across the board plus an additional 0.5% locality pay adjustment, to total a 5.2% average increase in 2024. The latest COLA is 3.2 percent for Social Security benefits, payable in January 2024. The 2023 federal retiree cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) will be 3.2% for those under the Civil Service Retirement System (CSRS) and 2.2 percent for those under the Federal Employees Retirement System (FERS). Military pay will increase by 5.2% in 2024. The military pay tables apply to active Navy, Marines, Army, Air Force, Coast

Guard, and Space Force members. The following graph from USASpending.gov illustrates the spending by awarding agencies for fiscal year 2023. These expenditures are expected to continue and increase in the years ahead. The expenditure categories reported in USASpending.gov do not include military or civilian personnel costs, which will substantially add to the total. Defense personnel costs in Guam, including Active Duty and Civilian employment, totaled \$781.5 million in FY2021.

The FY 2024 National Defense Authorization Act requires an assessment and recommendations for Guam operations. The results of this assessment could increase federal funding for Guam or other changes in operations and funding.

SEC. 1077. ASSESSMENT AND RECOMMENDATIONS RELATING TO INFRASTRUCTURE, CAPACITY, RESOURCES, AND PERSONNEL ON GUAM.

- (a) ASSESSMENT.—The Secretary of Defense, in coordination with the Commander of United States Indo-Pacific Command, shall assess the infrastructure, capacity, resource, and personnel requirements for Guam during fiscal years 2024 through 2029 to meet United States strategic objectives.
- (a) ASSESSMENT.—The Secretary of Defense, in coordination with the Commander of United States Indo-Pacific Command, shall assess the infrastructure, capacity, resource, and personnel requirements for Guam during fiscal years 2024 through 2029 to meet United States strategic objectives.
- (b) ELEMENTS.-The assessment under subsection (a) shall include the following elements:
- (1) An appraisal of the potential role Guam could play as a key logistics and operational hub for the United States military in the Indo-Pacific region.
- (2) An assessment of whether current Department of Defense infrastructure, capacity, resources, and personnel in Guam are sufficient to meet the expected demands during relevant operations and contingency scenarios.
- (3) An assessment of the adequacy of civilian infrastructure in Guam for supporting the requirements of United States Indo-Pacific Command, including—
- (A) the resilience of such infrastructure in the event of a natural disaster; and
- (B) the vulnerability of such infrastructure to cyber threats.
- (4) A plan, including timelines and associated estimated costs, to improve Department of Defense infrastructure, capacity, resources, and personnel in Guam during fiscal years 2024 through 2029 to meet United States Indo-Pacific Command strategic objectives, including the need for Department of Defense civilian recruiting and retention programs, such as cost-of-living adjustments, initiatives for dealing with any shortages of civilian employees, and programs to improve quality-of-life for personnel assigned to Guam.
- (5) An assessment of the implementation of Joint Task Force Micronesia.
- (6) Any other matters determined relevant by the Secretary.
- (c) REPORT.—Not later than 180 days after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of Defense shall submit to the congressional defense committees a report including the results of the assessment required under subsection (a).

Real Estate

Guam real estate sales Volume (Mil.) increased by 17.7 percent from the fourth quarter of 2022 to the fourth quarter of 2023, while the number of transactions declined by 18.7 according to figures provided in Cornerstone Valuation Guam, Inc.'. The sales changes can be attributed to rising prices and dramatic interest rate increases making housing purchases unaffordable for most residents. While the number of sales declined, the prices continued to rise at a slower pace due to pent-up demand and limited inventory.

Resident Expenditures

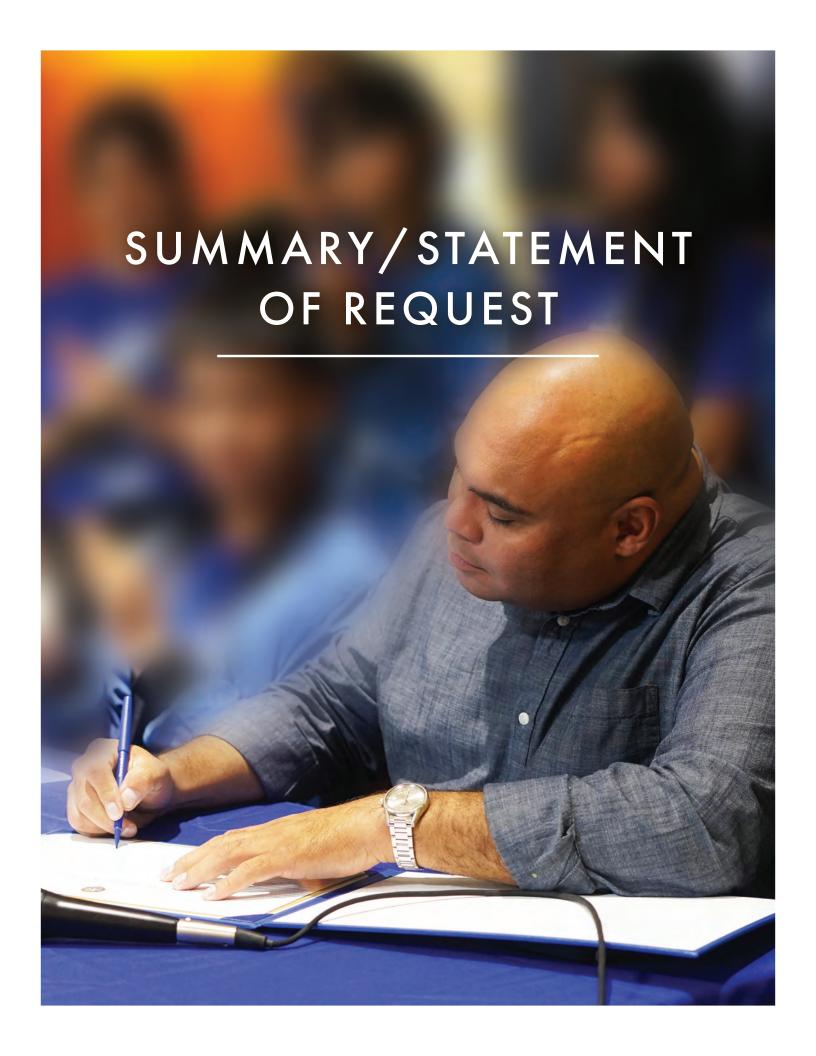
Resident expenditures are about 35 percent of total direct spending in the economy, according to the 2017 Guam Economic Census, and their incomes are heavily dependent on inflows from external sources. Hence, as those flows increase or decrease, so should their expenditures. They are affected indirectly by changes in employment associated with additional business and directly as recipients of increased federal pensions and Social Security payments. Wage earnings are the primary income source for most people. Other sources of income also represent a sizeable component of disposable income. These include federal and local government pensions, social security, rental, interest, investment income, and transfer payments for food, housing, and medical services.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Food and Nutrition Service provided notice of benefit amounts in 2024 for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance (SNAP) program. SNAP benefits are adjusted annually based on the rate of inflation. The announced increase in payments for 2024, which started Oct. 1, 2023, was about 3.6 percent. Maximum allotments, deductions, and income eligibility amounts also increased for 2024. As of June 2021, the number of Guam residents participating in SNAP was 39,055 in 13,938 households.

Employment and average weekly hours paid have continued their recovery from the pandemic lows. Employment numbers began a moderate rebound in December 2020, with the recovery continuing. Total employment as of September 2023 remains 1,020 jobs below the pre-pandemic employment of 67,580 in December 2019 despite an increase of 4,730 jobs in the construction industry the majority of which were foreign workers under the H-2 visa category. Preliminary Private Sector employment figures increased by 1,840 in the quarter ending September 2023 and were up by 1,980 jobs over the year. Average weekly hours paid increased from 36.8 to 38.2, and average weekly earnings increased from \$621.98 to \$690.56 or 11.0 percent over the year.

Unemployment rates in Guam have followed the direction of those of the U.S. and Hawaii; however, Guam unemployment rates have been more severely impacted by the pandemic than the U.S. and Hawaii as Guam has a more significant share of international tourism relative to the size of the economy. The Guam unemployment rate increased from 3.6 percent in September 2019 to 19.4 percent in December 2020. The unemployment rate has fallen in the last ten of the previous eleven quarters, dropping to 4.1 percent in September 2023. Income is the primary determinant of consumer spending, but financial and real estate asset value changes and the confidence level in the economy may also affect consumer expenditures.

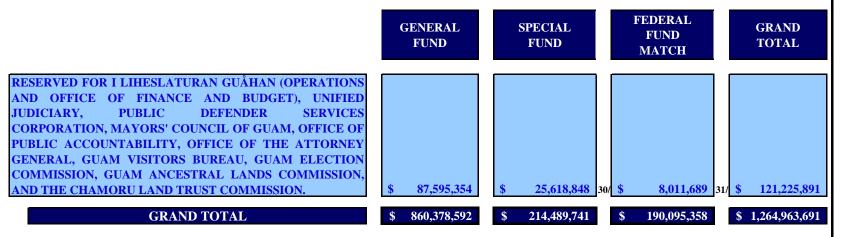

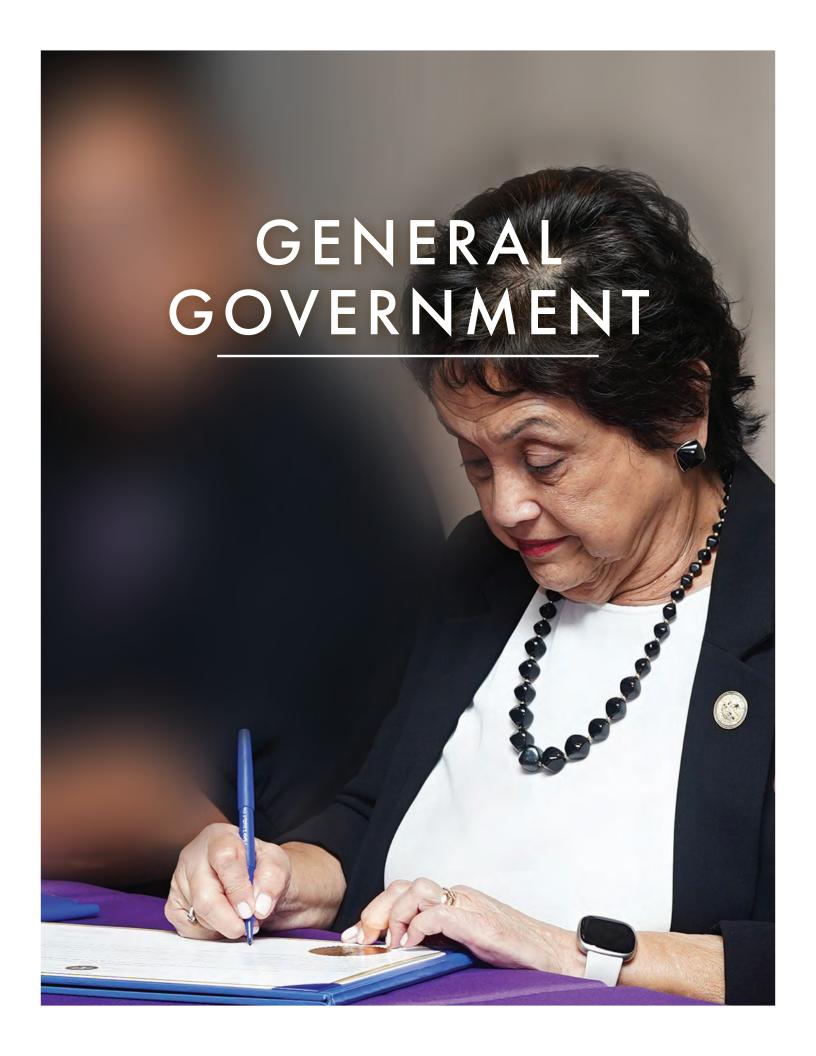

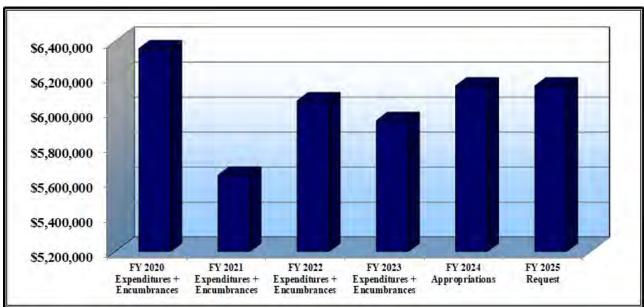




OFFICE OF I MAGA'HÅGAN GUÅHAN AND I SIGUNDO MAGA'LÅHEN GUÅHAN

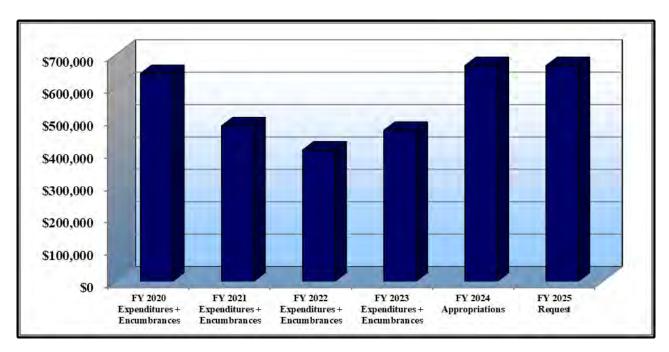

The Office serves not only the medically indigent but also residents of Guam and those residents referred off-island by assisting in coordinating appropriate medical appointments, temporary housing, and transportation services.

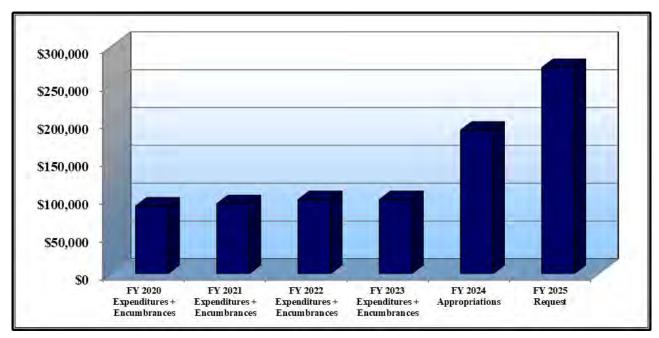

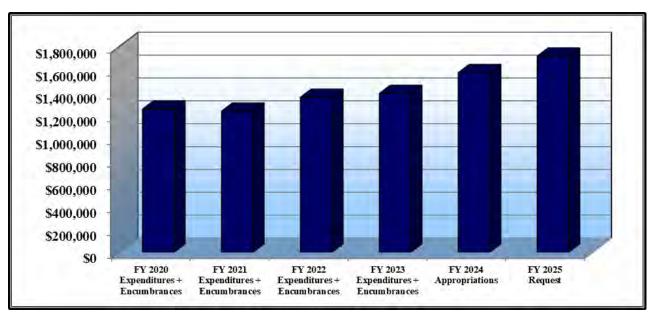

CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION

The Civil Service Commission is primarily responsible for the adjudicatory functions, specifically, to hear adverse action appeals relative to employee suspension, demotion or dismissal from the classified service, whether such right to appeal to the Commission is established in the personnel rules governing the employee; entertain grievance appeals pursuant to rules and regulations; investigate upon receipt of report on political activity involving an employee of the Government. It is responsible for enforcement and administration on ethics in public contracting in the Government of Guam via investigations, recommendations, and orientations. The Commission also reviews and investigates all classified personnel actions for compliance with personnel rules and regulations.

ADMINISTRATION

The Department of Administration provides administrative, fiscal, and policy direction for execution of government support services. Provided services include orientation and training programs, and data for statistical, payroll wage, and related purposes. It administers recruitment and placement of eligible applications, employee fringe benefits, enrollment into the government retirement system, and non-adjudicatory functions on rulemaking, creation of new positions, pay scales, personnel rules and the like, in accordance with Public Law No. 28-68. Other services include procurement of supplies and equipment, storage and distribution of donated surplus properties, and the preservation and disposal of government records. Its financial responsibilities cover revenues for obligations and investments, governmental accounting, and consultation services.

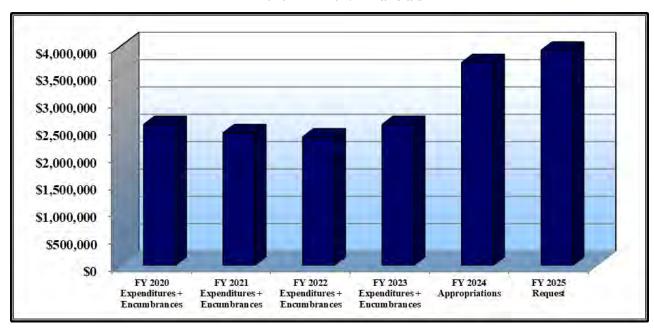

OFFICE OF TECHNOLOGY

The Office of Technology (OTech) is responsible for providing Information Technology (IT) support, maintenance, and security for all Government of Guam departments and agencies. OTech was originally established as a division within the Department of Administration but is now a stand-alone agency pursuant to Public Law 34-76. OTech's other duties consist of the development of an organized approach to information resource management for the Government of Guam and provide information/technology/communications services to all administrators of the various agencies/programs in the design and management of information systems. Furthermore, OTech evaluates the economic justification, system design, and suitability of information equipment and related services, review/recommend the purchase and lease acquisition of information equipment and contracts for related services by agencies/programs, and monitor trends and advances in information technology and technical infrastructure.

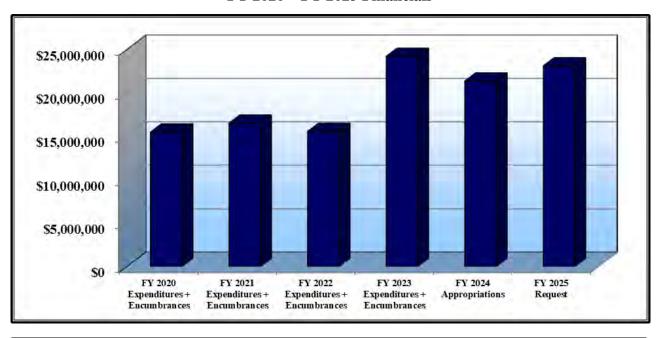

PUBLIC WORKS

The Department of Public Works provides engineering services in accordance with industry standards and regulations, reviews and approves, inspects, and monitors all proposed construction and government capital projects to ensure strict compliance with building codes, construction laws and procurement regulations to government contracting. It oversees all highway construction and rehabilitation projects in conjunction with federal highway regulations, and provides island-wide maintenance support for roadway beautification programs, flood and hazard mitigation controls, disaster preparation and recovery measures, and highway safety and traffic program services. The Department is responsible for maintenance of government buildings and vehicles, and is tasked with providing safe and efficient busing services to both public and private schools, as well as providing transportation services for emergency evacuation and civil activities as authorized by the Governor or his/her designee.

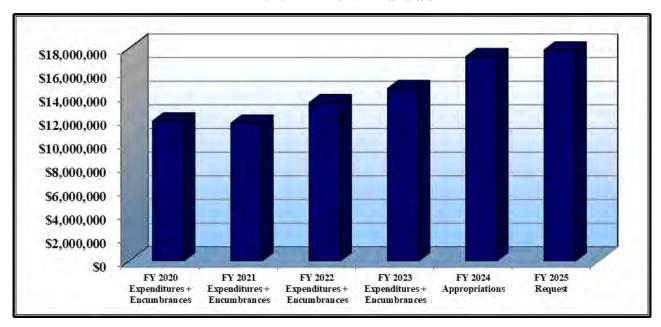

It maintains financial integrity and viability through an equitable system of tax and revenue collections. The Department provides timely tax data, minimizing the amount of delinquent taxes, thus reducing the recording and processing time for payments received. It protects the general public from unethical and/or unfair business practices through the enforcement of local and federal licensing, examination and registration laws. In addition, the Department is responsible for the administration of the Guam Passport Office.

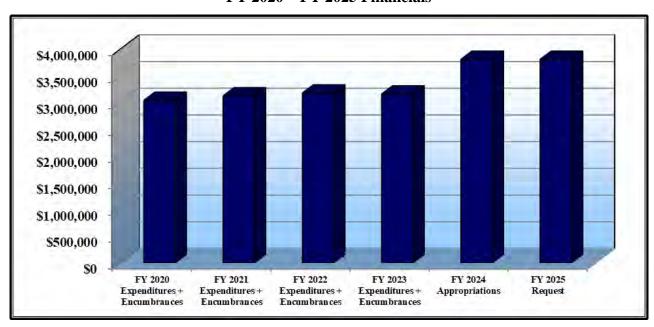

LAND MANAGEMENT

The Department of Land Management is tasked with the management of government land resources for the public benefit in preserving the public trust. Its primary planning activities focuses on facilitating the development and maintenance of a comprehensive land use program capable of ensuring maximum yield on government and non-government lands. Secondary goals include the fostering of orderly growth, as well as the harmonious development and enforcement of land-use regulations. Its recording functions involve storing all land records such as land titles, maps, land exchanges, subdivisions, on microfilm, blueprint, and other electronic means, in accordance with the Geographical Informational System. Additionally, survey activities ensure the complete plotting of all government lands on the island's cadastral map, in compliance with the Guam Geodetic Triangulation Network system.

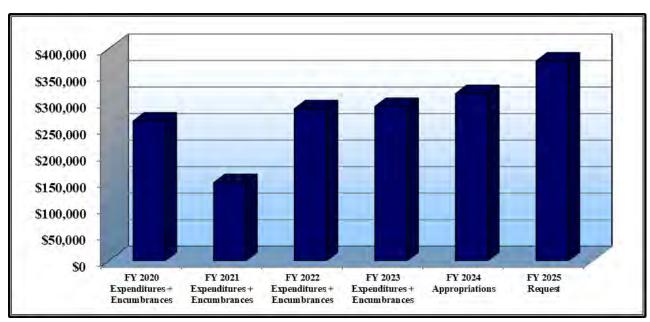

This program provides services for the administration, maintenance, and enforcement of licensing, and professional labor regulations. The seven-member Board of Registration for Professional Engineers, Architects, and Land Surveyors (PEALS) prescribes educational experience qualifications for the registration and examinations of engineers, architects, landscape architects, and land surveyors. It administers examinations, issues registrations and enforces industry licensing standards. It also monitors compliance with standards of conduct for registered engineers, architects, landscape architects, and land surveyors.

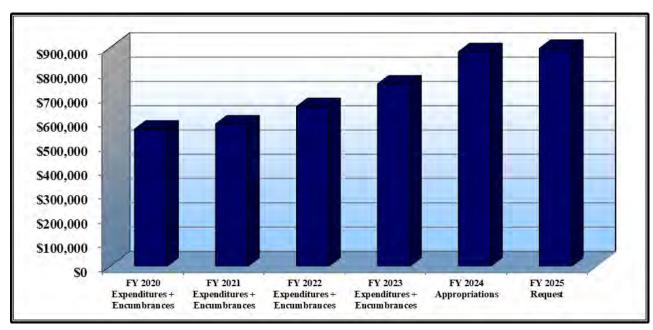

CONTRACTORS LICENSE BOARD

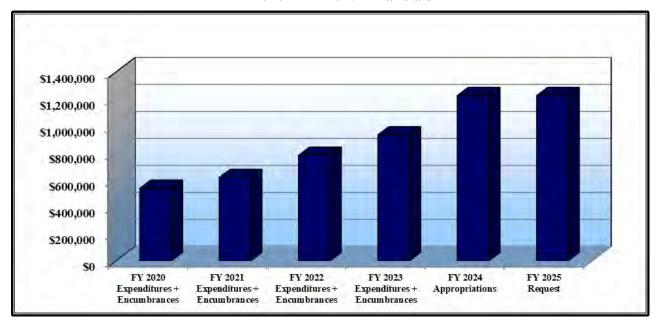

OFFICE OF VETERANS AFFAIRS

The Office of Veterans Affairs is responsible for the administration of all local laws applicable to veterans of the Armed Forces of the United States of America. This includes programs to assist in obtaining potential benefits and privileges respective to compensation, pension, education, home loans, medical and others under Title 38 of the United States Code regulating veteran benefits. The Office coordinates and facilitates the return of veterans and provides outreach programs for homebound, hospitalized or homeless veterans. Additionally, it prepares and coordinates military burials, events such as Memorial Day, Veterans Day, Liberation Day and Prisoner of War / Missing-In-Action Day and related governmental functions. Custody and oversight of the Guam Veterans Cemetery and the Old U.S. Naval Cemetery now fall under this Office. The Office is responsible for the establishment and maintenance of a Guam Veterans Registry. Additionally, Public Law No. 28-46 places the Office of Veterans Affairs within the Office of I Maga'hågan Guåhan.

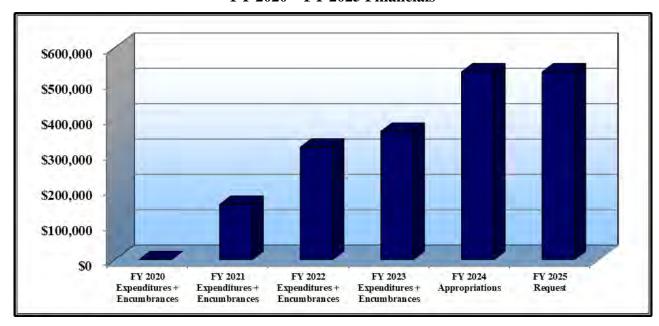

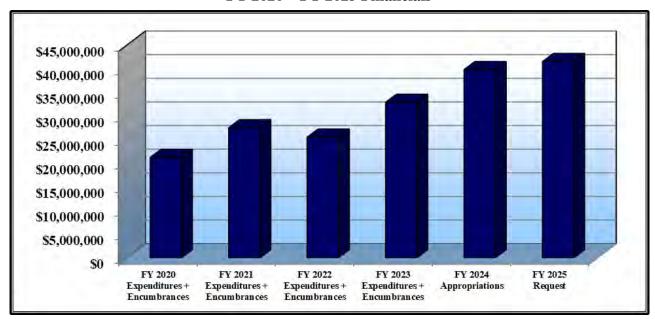

CORRECTIONS

The Department of Corrections shall protect the public from the destructive action of law offenders by operating a safe, secure, humane and efficient corrections system, and provide staff services for the Judiciary, the Guam Parole Board, probation officers, and interested agencies of the Executive Branch. It provides custodial care to prison inmates, and the parole and detainee population in accordance with judicial disposition. Custodial care is provided for inmates on-island and off-island and includes services for rehabilitation, security, transportation, and treatment. The Department also makes recommendations for the potential release of inmates to the Guam Parole Board.

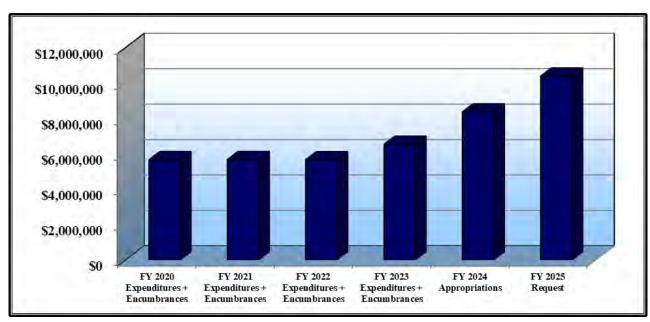

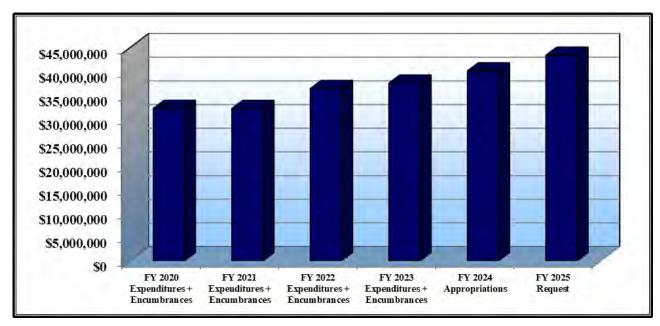

GUAM FIRE

The Guam Fire Department is in charge with enforcement of the International Fire Code and of local fire laws and regulations. It provides emergency assistance and responds to fire emergencies, medical emergencies, hazardous material incidents, and other emergency situations to ensure the safety of all the residents. The department is responsible for conducting fire drills, inspections of premises and areas relative to prevention of fires, fire hydrant inspections, land and sea rescue operations as well as provide on-scene stabilization, and transport of patients to the nearest and appropriate medical facility, rescuing victims in extreme situations that includes high-angle and trench rescues, and to isolate, identify, notify, mitigate, and terminate hazardous incidents.

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GUAM BEHAVIORAL HEALTH AND WELLNESS CENTER

The Guam Behavioral Health & Wellness Center (GBHWC) is responsible to provide mental health services for clients suffering mental disorders, emotional disturbances, behavioral problems, familial dysfunctions, and drug and alcohol abasements. It maintains residential and day treatment services under Guma Man Hoben, Guma Ifil and New Beginnings programs. The Department, under Executive Order No. 2008-25 became the primary agency to manage the Level of Care and Guma Bethesda programs which were transferred from the Department of Integrated Services for Individuals with Disabilities. It also operates an acute psychiatric inpatient facility, provides emergency consultations to related agencies and clinics, offers a 24-hour telephone crisis intervention to all island residents, and provides educational training for mental health and drug prevention and abuse programs.

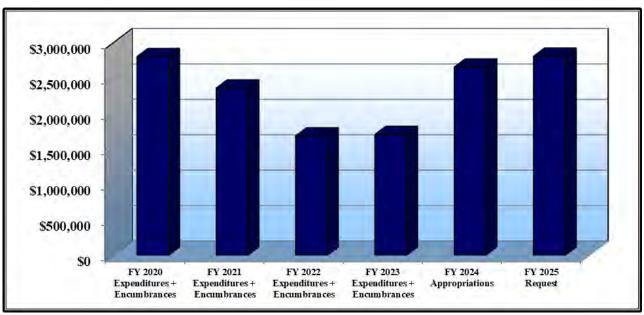

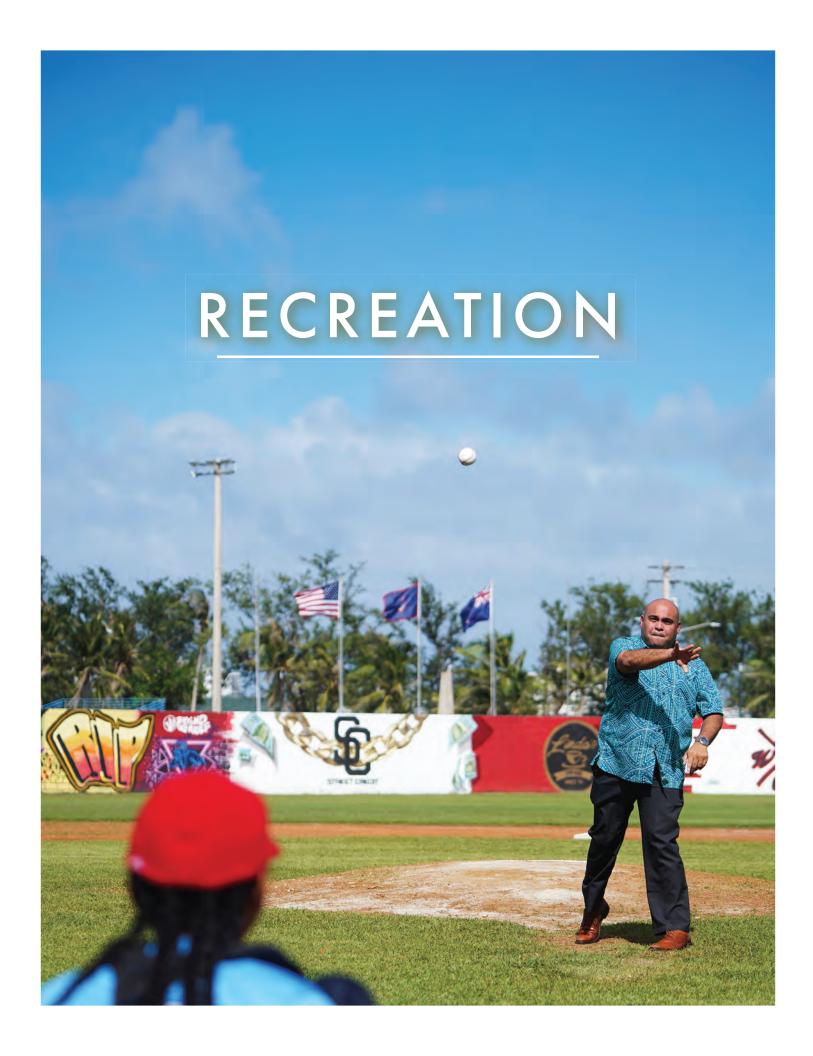

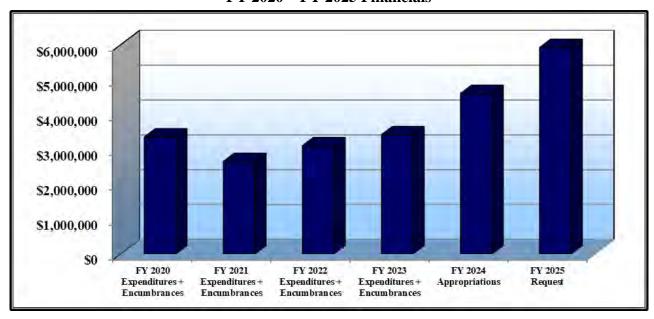

PARKS AND RECREATION

The Department of Parks and Recreation's primary mission is to protect and enhance designated parks, recreation facilities, and areas for the enjoyment of the island community. Its major activities include the administration, acquisition, design, development, operation, maintenance, and protection of all park areas on Guam. Additionally, its historic resource activities include the preservation, identification, survey and inventory of properties of historical value. The Department coordinates recreational activities such as leagues and tournaments, health and fitness programs, special events, and provides lifeguards and other recreational services. It also provides memorial services for three (3) public cemeteries. Lastly, the Department employs Park Rangers who are responsible for the enforcement of all park and civil regulations, the dissemination of park information and the protection and assistance to all park visitors and vendors.

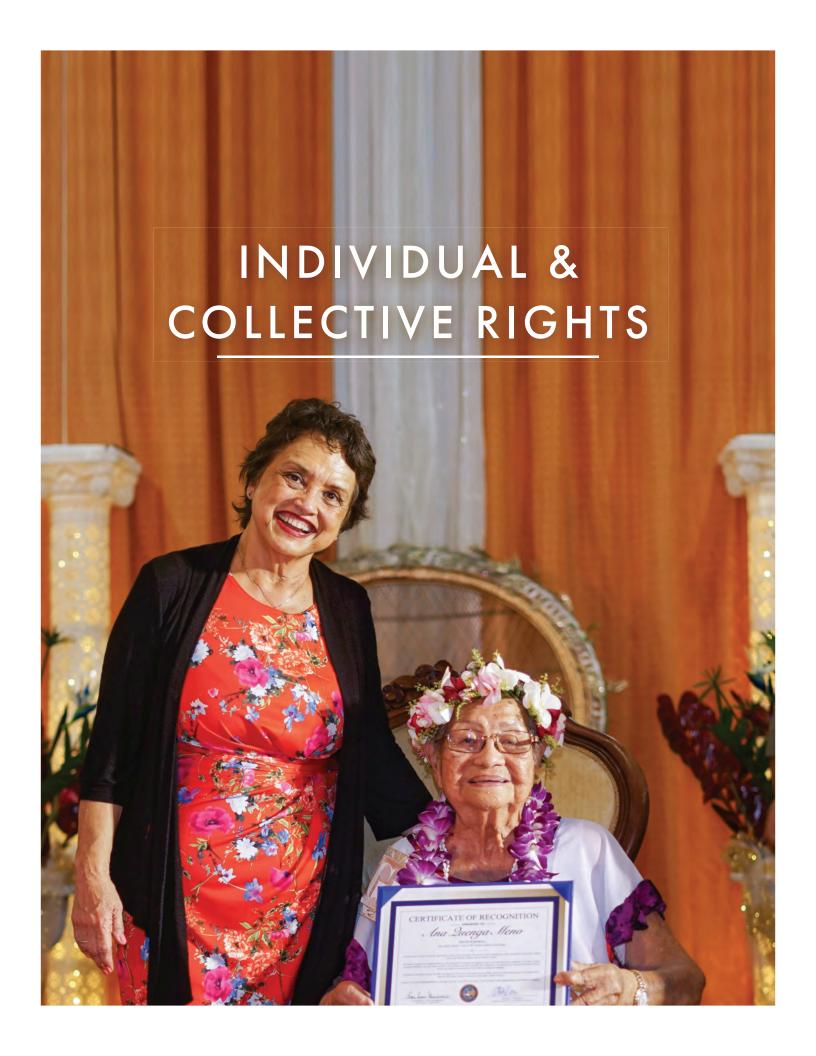

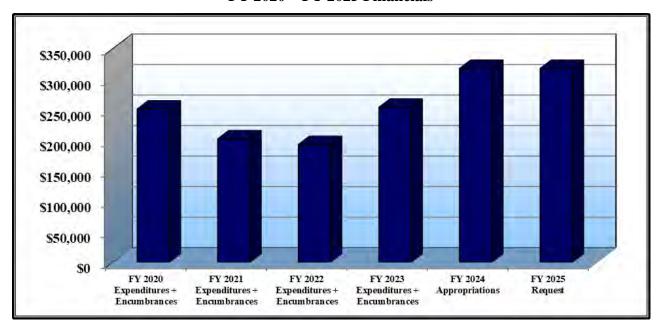
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COMMISSION ON DECOLONIZATION

I Kumision provides updates to the CHamoru-English dictionary and encourages the development of CHamoru in publications. It functions as a reviewer of curricular materials developed by Guam's public educational agencies and is the reviewer of publication in CHamoru. I Kumision coordinates with language authorities and agencies in the Northern Mariana Islands, makes available translation services on a fee-based system, and develops CHamoru dissemination projects to include research, publications, social media, and public awareness relating CHamoru language, history, and culture on a regular and consistent basis. I Kumision serves as the Guam Place Names Commission and reviews place names to ensure maintenance of original CHamoru place names and use of CHamoru in the proposing of new place names.

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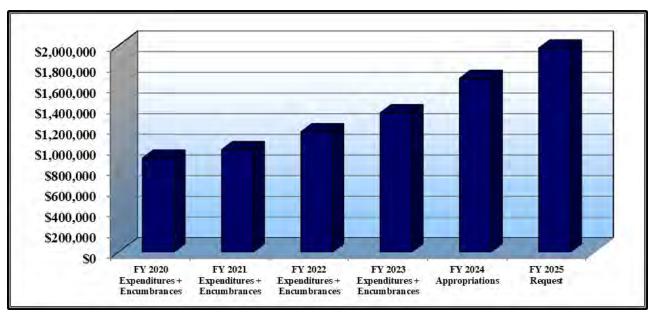
ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT



BUREAU OF STATISTICS AND PLANS

The Bureau of Statistics and Plans (BSP) provides technical assistance, support, and planning information throughout the Government of Guam in an effort to integrate and coordinate all levels of development planning. It has the ability to appraise, coordinate and assist in the preparation of short and long-range planning programs, policies, studies, and statistics that further Guam's economic, social, land use, environmental, infrastructure, and physical development through the Bureau's Business and Economic Statistics Program, Socio-Economic Planning Program, Planning Information Program, and Guam Coastal Management Program. The Bureau also prepares plan elements that are outside the priorities of the staff and line agencies. Furthermore, the Bureau conducts the census under the auspices of the U.S. Census Bureau; compile, collect, develop and publish quarterly scientific exports and imports, consumer prices and other information relating to economic conditions; compile periodically a census of businesses and industries on Guam, and analyze and publish this information in such forms as to be most valuable to Guam's businesses and industries.

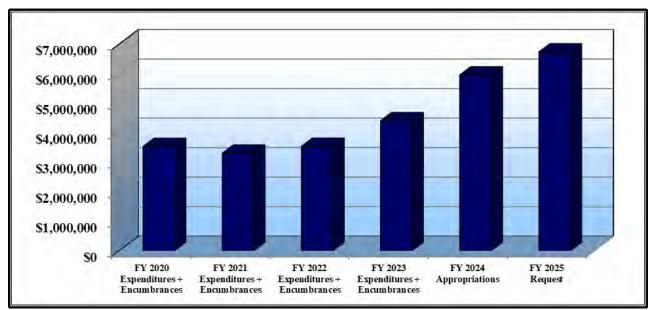

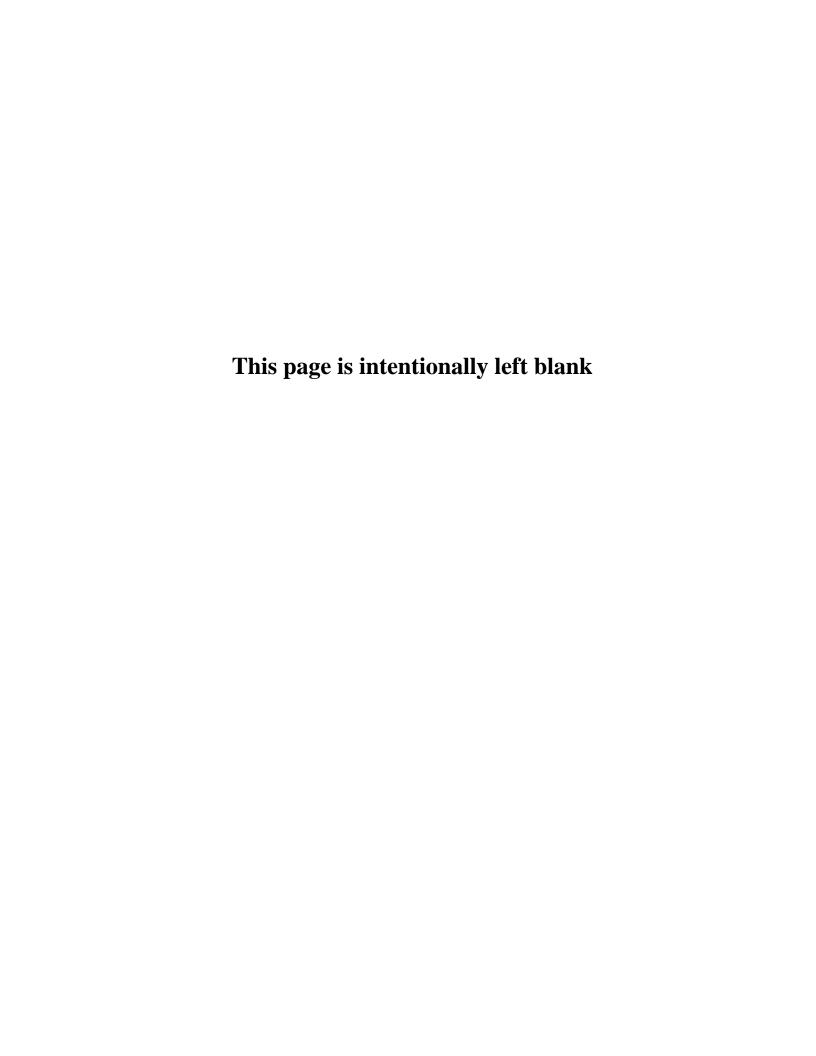

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MISCELLANEOUS	APPROPRIATIONS

- Section 1. Appropriation to the Guam Department of Education for *CHamoru* Studies.

 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, for Fiscal Year 2025, the sum of Five Hundred Thirteen

 Thousand Eight Hundred Twenty Four Dollars (\$513,824) is appropriated from the General Fund-to the

 Guam Department of Education for the *CHamoru* Studies Division to be expended for personnel salaries

 and benefits, contractual services, professional development and training, supplies and materials, and

 equipment for the support and the implementation of the Content Standards and Performance Indicators

 of the course syllabi for the emphasis of fluency and for the promotion of the proficiency skills in the areas

 of listening, speaking, reading, and writing in the *CHamoru* language.
- Products for Guam Public Schools. For Fiscal Year 2025, the sum of Twenty Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000) is appropriated from the General Fund to the Guam Department of Education for the purchase of menstrual hygiene products for Guam public schools. All public schools on Guam that serve students in grades five (5) through twelve (12) *shall* provide menstrual hygiene products, such as tampons and sanitary pads, in the nursing or counselor's offices of such schools; and, such products *shall* be provided to students at no charge to them.
- Section 3. Miscellaneous Healthy Futures Fund Appropriations to the Guam Department of Education.
- (a) **Interscholastic Sports Fund.** For Fiscal Year 2025, the sum of Six Hundred Fourteen Thousand One Hundred Sixty Five Dollars (\$614,165) is appropriated from the Healthy Futures Fund to the Guam Department of Education for the Interscholastic Sports Fund to be expended pursuant to § 7108, Chapter 7, Title 17 GCA. The appropriation made in this Subsection *shall* be available to fund sports

- programs, to include the payment of head coaches, assistant coaches, league fees, busing services, and other expenses normally associated with interscholastic sports.
- Hundred Seventy Seven Thousand Five Hundred Eighty Nine Dollars (\$277,589) is appropriated from the Healthy Futures Fund to the Guam Department of Education for health and physical education programs, intramural sports, and similar activities.
 - Section 4. Appropriation to the Guam Department of Education (GDOE) for Textbooks and Collateral Material. The following is the appropriation to the Guam Department of Education for the purchase of textbooks, e-book readers and collateral materials, to include software, sheet music, and music books, in accordance with the following terms and conditions:

- (\$1,500,000) is appropriated from the General Fund from Fiscal Year 2026 revenues to the GDOE for the purchase or development and production of textbooks and instructional materials related to specific content areas. The Superintendent of GDOE may, *if* necessary, through agreements with textbook vendors, defer payment for said materials until after October 1, 2025, but *no later than* December 31, 2025, with the full faith and credit of the Government of Guam.
- (b) The Superintendent of GDOE *shall* order materials funded by this Section for Fiscal Year 2025 *no later than* March 1, 2025. The Bureau of Budget and Management Research *shall* release such allotments as are necessary to ensure that said materials are ordered by March 1, 2025. The Superintendent of GDOE *shall* receive said materials and distribute them to schools *no later than* thirty (30) days before the start of the school calendar established pursuant to § 4111, Chapter 4, Title 17 of the Guam Code Annotated. All funds appropriated for said materials *shall not* be used for any other purpose.

(c) On the first (1st) day of each quarter of Fiscal Year 2025, the Superintendent of GDOE
shall provide to I Maga'hågan Guåhan and the Speaker of I Liheslaturan Guåhan, and post on the GDOE
website, a detailed report regarding all receipts, purchase orders, and expenditures for textbooks and
instructional materials. Said report shall be accompanied by the certified list of textbooks approved by
the Guam Education Board and a list or copies of all purchase orders issued related to this Section. The
report shall summarize:

- (1) purchases by allotment account number, unit cost, and the total cost of textbooks or instructional materials charged against an appropriation account, the vendor, quantity, title, copyright date, and International Standard Book Number (ISBN) of textbooks or instructional materials ordered, the allocation of such books by school and grade, and whether books are for teachers or students;
- (2) instructional materials adopted in accordance with § 4104, Chapter 4, Title 17 of the Guam Code Annotated; and
- (3) other information that may be useful *or* that is requested by *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* regarding the funds appropriated and authorized herein. Non-compliance with these reporting requirements by the Superintendent of GDOE *shall* result in the sanctions and penalties imposed by this Act.

Section 5. Appropriation to the Guam Department of Education for Alternative Dispute Resolution/Mediation Services. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, for Fiscal Year 2025, the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000) is appropriated from the Guam Educational Facilities Fund to the Guam Department of Education to obtain and provide Alternative Dispute Resolution/Mediation Services to all public schools on Guam.

1	Section 6. Appropriation to the Guam Department of Education for Grounds
2	Maintenance for Schools. For Fiscal Year 2025, the sum of Three Hundred Eighty Five Thousand
3	Twenty Two Dollars (\$385,022) is appropriated from the Guam Educational Facilities Fund for the

5	Section 7. Guam Department of Education (GDOE) Summer School Fund. Pursuant to §

- (i) Northern and Southern Soil and Water Conservation Districts Program. Such appropriation in this Section from the General Fund is for operations and activities of the Northern and Southern Soil and Water Conservation Districts (SWCD) Program and *shall* be equally divided between the Northern and Southern Soil Conservation Districts. Expenditures from this appropriation *shall* be made upon the approval of the District Directors, with the consent of the SWCD Board and *shall not* require further approval by the University of Guam *or* any other government entity.
- (j) **KPRG** (**Public Radio**). Such appropriation in this Section from the General Fund is for KPRG (Public Radio) operations. The President of the University of Guam *shall* disburse the funds to KPRG. *No later than* thirty (30) days after the close of each fiscal quarter of Fiscal Year 2025, the General Manager of KPRG *shall* submit to the President of the University of Guam, and post on KPRG's website, all reports mandated by this Act.
- (k) **Guampedia Foundation.** Such appropriation in this Section from the General Fund is for the operations of the Guampedia Foundation.
- (l) University of Guam Press (Publishing House). Such appropriation in this Section from the General Fund is for the operations and activities of the University of Guam Press. Such sum appropriated in this Section are authorized for use as the local matching requirement for Federal Grants-in-Aid. The University of Guam Press is to assist the Guam Department of Education with their textbooks and collateral materials for the development. Localization, production, reproduction and/or purchase of

- textbooks, instructional materials, curriculum guides, and/or other print, digital, and audio resources, as well as for the development and facilitations of professional development programs to support the
- 3 implementation and success of these resources.

4 Section 9. Appropriations to the University of Guam Capital Improvements Fund.

- 5 (a) For Fiscal Year 2025, the sum of One Million One Hundred Fifty Eight Thousand Two
 6 Hundred Eighty Three Dollars (\$1,158,283) is appropriated from the General Fund to the University of
 7 Guam Capital Improvements Fund for the purpose of paying rental payments due under the lease-back
 8 agreement pursuant to Public Law 31-229:18, as repealed and reenacted by Public Law 31-277.
 - (b) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, for Fiscal Year 2025, the sum of Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000) is appropriated from the Guam Educational Facilities Fund to the University of Guam Capital Improvements Fund for the purpose of paying for the debt service pursuant to § 16132, Chapter 16, Division 3, Title 17 of the Guam Code Annotated.
 - Section 10. Appropriation to the University of Guam for the Guam Cancer Trust Fund. Notwithstanding § 26603(d)(5)(B), Chapter 26, Article 6, Title 11 of the Guam Code Annotated, for Fiscal Year 2025, the sum of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) is appropriated from the Healthy Futures Fund to the University of Guam for the administration of the Guam Cancer Trust Fund. This appropriation *shall* be used to fund cancer screening, treatment, educational outreach programs, and support services for qualified applicants.
 - Section 11. Appropriation to the University of Guam for the Guam Green Growth (G3) Initiative. For Fiscal Year 2025, the sum of Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000) is appropriated from the General Fund to the University of Guam to fund the Research Corporation of the University of Guam (RCUOG) for the *sole* purpose of supporting the Guam Green Growth (G3) Initiative administered by the UOG Center for Island Sustainability. Aligned with the seventeen (17) United Nations Sustainable

Development Goals, G3 cultivates an ecosystem for transformative action to achieve a more sustainable, prosperous, and equitable future for Guam. Activities will stimulate island circular economy industries to contribute to a new green economy, reduce the production of waste, reduce reliance on imports, and promote sustainable actions throughout the community. The expenditures authorized in this Section *shall* be used for G3 initiative operations and administrative costs, supplies and equipment, membership in regional and global sustainability organizations, and to support educational and outreach activities. Said funds *shall not* be transferred or used for any other purpose. The sum appropriated herein is authorized for use as a local matching requirement for Federal Grants-in-Aid and *shall* be prioritized for the local matching requirement of the UOG Sea Grant Program.

The UOG Center for Island Sustainability *shall* prepare and submit an expenditure plan for said use of these funds for the Guam Green Growth (G3) Initiative to the Guam Environmental Protection Agency (GEPA) Board of Directors, who *shall* review the expenditure plan no later than thirty (30) days upon receipt of the plan. The UOG Center for Island Sustainability *shall not* expend funds allocated herein prior to the approval of the expenditure plan and must meet all applicable rules and regulations.

Section 12. Appropriation to the University of Guam for the Sea Grant Program. For Fiscal Year 2025, the sum of Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000) is appropriated from the General Fund to the University of Guam Sea Grant Special Fund (established by Public Law 35-114) to fund the Sea Grant Program administered by the University of Guam Center for Island Sustainability. UOG has been a Land Grant institution since 1972, and the status has brought significant opportunities for UOG, Guam, and the region in agriculture, terrestrial resources management, and development of the community. Having received a formal notice to review from the National Sea Grant Director, UOG now has a once-in-a-generation opportunity to achieve "Sea Grant Status" and bring similar opportunities to Guam and the region in marine resource management, environmental stewardship, and the community

development of coastal communities. The National Sea Grant College Program is a partnership between universities and the federal government's National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), an agency within the U.S. Department of Commerce. The UOG Sea Grant applies research, extension, and educational activities that sustain and develop island environments while integrating the knowledge and culture of island people. The UOG Sea Grant provides local workforce development training in marine and environmental sciences through research funding, internships, fellowships and grants; funds research competitions among faculty, colleges, and nonprofit organizations to promote understanding and better management of coastal resources in Guam and Micronesia; and, perpetuates traditional local knowledge in navigation and fisheries through teaching, research, outreach, and apprenticeships. The expenditures authorized in this Section shall be used for UOG Sea Grant operations and administrative costs, hiring of faculty and administrative staff, facility improvement, and supplies and equipment. The sum appropriated herein is authorized for use as a local matching requirement for Grants-in-Aid and shall be prioritized for use as the local matching requirement to achieve and maintain Sea Grant Institutional Status, which has the potential to garner a 1:2 federal contribution of up to One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) in federal funds to UOG per year.

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The President of the University of Guam *shall* post on UOG's website and *shall* submit to *I Maga'hågan Guåhan* and the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*, in a Microsoft Excel file and written report, annual reports for the UOG Sea Grant Special Fund. At a minimum, said reports *shall* include: program mission statements, objectives, sources of revenue, expenditures by budget classification, number of employees, and contracts, and shall describe program accomplishments in the fiscal year reported.

- the Guam Educational Facilities Fund is to the MCOG for Fiscal Year 2025, to be expended in accordance with plans approved by the MCOG or the respective village municipal planning council and filed with the Director of Administration, to fund public safety and social education programs that enforce alcohol regulations, reduce underage drinking, support traffic safety, reduce drug-related violence and abuse, to support government of Guam substance abuse prevention programs, and to support organized sports programs in the community.
- (d) Appropriation to the Mayors' Council of Guam for Host Community Premiums. Such appropriation in this Section from the Host Community Fund is to the Municipal Planning Council Funds of the villages of *Ordot* and *Inarajan* pursuant to § 51405, Article 4, Chapter 51, Title 10 of the Guam Code Annotated, as added by Public Law 30-165.
- **Section 66. Appropriation for the Guam Youth Congress.** For Fiscal Year 2025, the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000) is appropriated from the General Fund to *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* for the Guam Youth Congress.
- Section 67. Competitive Wage Act Study. I Maga'hågan Guåhan is hereby authorized to expend such funds necessary to procure the services of a consulting expert on classification and compensation in public employment to conduct a study of all government of Guam positions, to include positions covered under the Nurse and Educator Pay Plans. The scope of work provisions of the contract shall include the conducting of compensation training for the human resources staff throughout the government of Guam.

Section 68. Pacific Islands Development Bank. I Maga'hågan Guåhan is hereby authorized to deposit such funds necessary into the Pacific Islands Development Bank as authorized under Public

Law 22-148.

- Section 69. Real Property Triennial Re-valuation. I Maga'hågan Guåhan is hereby authorized to expend such funds necessary to procure the services for the real property tax triennial revaluation.
 - Section 70. Community Maintenance Workers. I Maga'hågan Guåhan is hereby authorized to fund up to Seven Million Seven Hundred Ninety Nine Thousand Nine Hundred Fifty Six Dollars (\$7,799,956) to the Mayors Council of Guam (MCOG) for the community maintenance workers; provided, that the source of funds is reported to the Speaker of I Liheslaturan Guåhan at least five (5) days prior. Such funds appropriated in this Section may be used by the MCOG to fund operational requirements related to the tasks performed by the community maintenance workers to include, but not limited to, supplies, equipment, capital outlay, utilities, and other miscellaneous expenses.
 - Appropriation Authorization for MIP, Medicaid, and Operations. The unexpended balance of appropriations from the General Fund and Special Funds to the Department of Public Health and Social Services (DPHSS) for operations, Medically Indigent Program (MIP), and Medicaid for Fiscal Year 2023, Fiscal Year 2024, and Fiscal Year 2025 *shall not* revert to the General Fund and Special Funds and *shall* be available until fully expended for operations, MIP, and Medicaid. The Director of DPHSS *shall* submit a report to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* regarding the allocation, demographics, and expenditures of the appropriations contained herein *no later than* thirty (30) days after the end of each quarter and post the same on the DPHSS website. The Director of Administration *shall* pay MIP and Medicaid vendors on a first-in, first-out basis.

- Section 72. Continuing Appropriation for the Office of I Maga'hågan Guåhan.
- 2 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the unexpended balance of funds appropriated to the Office
- 3 of I Maga'hågan Guåhan for Fiscal Year 2024 and prior shall not lapse and shall continue to be available
- 4 until fully expended.
- 5 Section 73. Continuing Appropriation for Unified Judiciary of Guam. Notwithstanding
- 6 any other provision of law, the allotted but unexpended balance of funds appropriated to Unified Judiciary
- 7 of Guam for Fiscal Year 2024 and prior shall not lapse and shall continue to be available until fully
- 8 expended.
- 9 Section 74. Continuing Appropriation for the Mayors' Council of Guam. Notwithstanding
- any other provision of law, the allotted but unexpended balance of funds appropriated to the Mayors'
- 11 Council of Guam for Fiscal Year 2024 and prior shall not lapse and shall continue to be available until
- 12 fully expended.

CHAPTER IV

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_	/ .	MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIO	

Section 1. Retirement Option for Government of Guam Employees. A member of the Government of Guam Retirement Fund (GGRF) who is eligible for retirement may retire upon the complete remittance of his/her outstanding individual contributions to the Fund, including the employee and employer retirement contributions. Any and all fees, interest at actuarial rates, and penalties required by the GGRF *shall* be paid by the Government of Guam.

This Section *shall not* restrict the continuing remittance of existing GGRF contributions as required by law *or* by the GGRF. By the fifteenth (15th) day of each month, the Director of the GGRF *shall* provide a detailed report to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* regarding said remittances and the number of retirements pursuant to this Section during the previous month. Nothing herein *shall* be construed to abrogate any provision of § 8137(h) of Article 1, Chapter 8, Title 4 of the Guam Code Annotated.

Section 2. Government of Guam Health Insurance Program Enrollment for Employment Pursuant to § 8121(a), Article 1, Chapter 8 of Title 4 GCA. Any employee hired pursuant to § 8121(a), Article 1, Chapter 8, Title 4 of the Guam Code Annotated may only be eligible to enroll in the Government of Guam Health Insurance Program as an active employee.

Section 3. Temporary Employment of Retired Corrections Officers. The Department of Corrections (DOC) may hire retired Guam corrections officers *if* a critical need arises because of military activation of corrections officers, *or* absence due to a long-term disability status which has been certified by a medical doctor. Retired corrections officers hired under this Section may receive their retirement annuity while employed on this temporary basis. The DOC may exercise this hiring authority provided its authorized budget for personnel is *not* exceeded. The retiree hired *shall* fill such a vacant position and

shall be terminated when the incumbent returns from military service or absence. Retired corrections officers may be hired *only* in the ranks of Corrections Officer Supervisor I and below, *only* at Step 1, and *shall not* receive sick and annual leave. Officers hired under this Section *shall* meet the requirements for the position in question, *except* for written examinations. The Director of DOC *shall* certify that every retiree hired is fit for duty. Notwithstanding § 8121(a), Article 1, Chapter 8, Title 4 of the Guam Code Annotated, retirees hired temporarily pursuant hereto may continue to receive retirement benefits. Any employee hired under this Section *shall only* be eligible to enroll in the Government of Guam Health Insurance Program as an active employee. The DOC Director *shall* submit a report to *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* on July 1, 2025, and again thirty (30) days after the end of the fiscal year, of the number of retired officers hired pursuant to this Section, the positions filled, the length of employment, the cost of said hiring, and the nature of the critical need that was filled.

Section 4. Temporary Employment of Retired Guam Police Officers. The Guam Police Department (GPD) may hire retired Guam police officers *if* a critical need arises because of military activation of police officers, *or* absence due to a long-term disability status which has been certified by a medical doctor. The GPD may exercise this hiring authority *provided* its authorized budget for personnel is *not* exceeded. The retiree hired *shall* fill such a vacant position and *shall* be terminated when the incumbent returns from military service or absence. Retired officers may be hired *only* at the ranks of Sergeant I and below, *only* at Step 1, and *shall not* receive sick and annual leave. Officers hired under this Section *shall* first meet the requirements for the position in question, *except* for written examinations. The Chief of Police *shall* certify that every retiree hired is fit for duty. Notwithstanding § 8121(a), Article 1, Chapter 8, Title 4 of the Guam Code Annotated, retirees hired temporarily pursuant hereto may continue to receive retirement benefits. The GPD may pay for Civilian Volunteer Police Reserve stipends to a Police Reserve Officer to provide temporary services of a regular police officer. Any employee hired

under this Section *shall only* be eligible to enroll in the Government of Guam Health Insurance Program as an active employee. The Chief of Police *shall* submit a report to *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* on July 1, 2025, and again thirty (30) days after the end of the fiscal year, of the number of retired officers hired pursuant to this Section, the positions filled, the length of employment, the cost of said hiring, and the nature of the

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critical need that was filled.

Section 5. Temporary Employment of Retired Guam Fire Fighters. The Guam Fire Department (GFD) may hire retired GFD firefighters if a critical need arises because of military activation of GFD firefighters, or absence due to a long-term disability status which has been certified by a medical doctor. The GFD may exercise this hiring authority provided its authorized budget for personnel is not exceeded. The retiree hired shall fill such a vacant position and shall be terminated when the incumbent returns from military service or absence. Retired firefighters may be hired *only* at the ranks of Fire Service Specialist and below, only at Step 1, and shall not receive sick and annual leave. Retired firefighters hired under this Section shall first meet the requirements for the position in question, except for written examinations. The Fire Chief shall certify that every retiree hired is fit for duty. Notwithstanding § 8121(a), Article 1, Chapter 8, Title 4 of the Guam Code Annotated, retirees hired temporarily pursuant hereto may continue to receive retirement benefits. Any employee hired under this Section shall only be eligible to enroll in the Government of Guam Health Insurance Program as an active employee. The Fire Chief shall submit a report to I Liheslaturan Guåhan on July 1, 2025, and again thirty (30) days after the end of the fiscal year, of the number of retired firefighters hired pursuant to this Section, the positions filled, the length of employment, the cost of said hiring, and the nature of the critical need that was filled.

Section 6. Temporary Employment of Retired Customs and Quarantine Officers. The Customs and Quarantine Agency (CQA) may hire retired customs and quarantine officers *if* a critical need arises as a result of military activation of customs officers, *or* absence due to a long-term disability status

which has been certified by a medical doctor, or when vacancies cannot be filled within six (6) months because of the lack of qualified applicants. The CQA may exercise this hiring authority provided its authorized budget for personnel is not exceeded. The retired officer shall fill such a vacant position and shall be terminated when the incumbent returns from military service, or when a fully-qualified applicant is available. The retiree hired shall fill such a vacant position and shall be terminated when the incumbent returns from military service or absence. Retired officers may be hired *only* in the ranks of Customs Officer III and below, only at Step 1, and shall not receive sick and annual leave. Retired customs and quarantine officers hired pursuant to this Section shall meet the requirements for the position in question, except for written examinations. The Director of CQA shall certify that every retiree hired is fit for duty. The requirements of Chapter 51, Title 17 of the Guam Code Annotated are waived for employment pursuant hereto, except for § 51104(b)(4). Notwithstanding § 8121(a), Article 1, Chapter 8, Title 4 of the Guam Code Annotated, retirees hired temporarily pursuant to this Section may continue to receive their retirement benefits. Any employee hired under this Section shall only be eligible to enroll in the Government of Guam Health Insurance Program as an active employee. The Director of CQA shall submit a report to I Liheslaturan Guåhan on July 1, 2025, and again thirty (30) days after the end of the fiscal year, of the number of retired officers hired pursuant to this Section, the positions filled, the length of employment, the cost of said hiring, and the nature of the critical need that was filled.

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Section 7. Temporary Employment of Retired Department of Revenue and Taxation Employees. The Department of Revenue and Taxation (DRT) may hire retired DRT employees when a critical need arises. Examples of a critical need may include temporary staff shortages due to challenges with recruitment due to a limited pool of qualified individuals, military activation of DRT employees, or absence due to a long-term disability status which has been certified by a medical doctor, and instances where additional programs or mandates are required to be executed. The DRT may exercise this hiring

authority in the following divisions: Taxpayer Services Division, Tax Enforcement Division, Real Property Tax Division, Director's Office (Executive Direction), Regulatory Division, and Motor Vehicle Division, provided its authorized budget for personnel is *not* exceeded. The retiree hired *shall* fill such a vacant position and *shall* be terminated when the incumbent returns from military service or absence, when there is successful recruitment for the position, or within a reasonable time after the additional program or mandate for which the employee was hired is completed. Said retirees *shall* be hired at a minimum of Step 1 for the position in question, and *shall not* receive sick and annual leave benefits. Any employee hired under this Section *shall only* be eligible to enroll in the Government of Guam Health Insurance Program as an active employee. The DRT Director *shall* submit a report to *I Liheslaturan Guâhan* on July 1, 2025, and again thirty (30) days after the end of the fiscal year, of the number of retired employees hired pursuant to this Section, the positions filled, the length of employment, the cost of said hiring, and the nature of the critical need that was filled.

Section 8. Temporary Employment of Retired Government of Guam Social Workers. The Department of Public Health and Social Services (DPHSS) may hire retired social workers of the government of Guam *if* a critical need arises. DPHSS may exercise this hiring authority for social workers in the Child Protective Service, provided its authorized budget for personnel is *not* exceeded. Said retirees *shall* be hired at a minimum of Step 1 for the position in question, and *shall not* receive sick and annual leave. Notwithstanding § 8121(a), Article 1, Chapter 8, Title 4 of the Guam Code Annotated, retirees hired temporarily pursuant hereto may continue to receive retirement benefits. Any employee hired under this Section *shall only* be eligible to enroll in the Government of Guam Health Insurance Program as an active employee. The Director of DPHSS *shall* submit a report to *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* on July 1, 2025, and again thirty (30) days after the end of the fiscal year, of the number of retired employees hired pursuant

to this Section, the positions filled, the length of employment, the cost of said hiring, and the nature of the critical need that was filled.

Section 9. Temporary Employment of Retired GDOE Teachers. The Guam Department of Education (GDOE) may hire retired Guam teachers who are not eligible for Medicare Parts A and B, and who *shall* remain covered under the Government of Guam Group Health Insurance Program as a retired person, *if* a critical need arises as a result of military activation of GDOE teachers or absence due to a long-term disability status which has been certified by a medical doctor. The GDOE may exercise this hiring authority provided it does not exceed its budget for filling these positions. The retiree hired *shall* fill such a vacant position and *shall* be terminated when the incumbent returns from military service or absence. Retirees *shall* be hired at a minimum of Step 1 for the position in question and *shall not* receive sick and annual leave. Notwithstanding § 812l(a) of Article 1, Chapter 8, Title 4 GCA, retirees hired temporarily pursuant to this Section may continue to receive retirement benefits. The Superintendent of GDOE *shall* report to *1 Liheslaturan Guåhan* on July 1, 2025, and again thirty (30) days after the end of the fiscal year, the number of retired employees hired pursuant to this Section, the positions filled, the length of employment, the cost of said hiring, and the nature of the critical need that was filled.

Section 10. Temporary Employment of Retired Attorneys. The Attorney General of Guam, the Unified Judiciary of Guam, the Public Defender Service Corporation, and the Alternate Public Defender may hire retired government of Guam attorneys on a full or part-time basis when a critical need arises. These entities may exercise this hiring authority for attorneys, provided that the authorized budget for personnel for these entities are *not* exceeded. Said attorneys *shall* be hired at a maximum salary of up to Step 5 of the Attorney 4 pay scale, and *shall not* receive sick and annual leave. Notwithstanding § 8121(a), Article 1, Chapter 8, Title 4 of the Guam Code Annotated, retirees hired temporarily pursuant hereto may continue to receive retirement benefits. Any attorney hired under this Section *shall only* be

eligible to enroll in the Government of Guam Health Insurance Program as an active employee. Such employment *shall not* close vacancies to qualified applicants. Each entity *shall* report to *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* on July 1, 2025, and again thirty (30) days after the end of the fiscal year, the number of retired attorneys hired pursuant to this Section, the positions filled, the length of employment, the cost of said

hiring, and the nature of the critical need that was filled.

Staff. The Attorney General of Guam may hire retired government of Guam non-attorneys on a full or part-time basis when a critical need arises. The OAG may exercise this hiring authority for non-attorneys provided that the authorized budget for personnel for the entity is not exceeded. Said retirees *shall not* receive sick and annual leave. Notwithstanding § 58121(a) of Article 1, Chapter 8, Title 4 GCA, retirees hired temporarily pursuant to this Section may continue to receive retirement benefits. Any staff hired under this Section *shall only* be eligible to enroll in the Government of Guam Health Insurance Program as an active employee. Such employment *shall not* close vacancies to qualified applicants. The Office of the Attorney General of Guam *shall* report to *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* on July 1, 2025, and again thirty (30) days after the end of the fiscal year, of the number of retired staff hired pursuant to this Section, the positions filled, the length of employment, the cost of said hiring, and the nature of the critical need that was filled.

Section 12. Temporary Employment of Retired Department of Public Works Employees.

- (a) The Department of Public Works (DPW) may hire retired Guam DPW employees when a critical need arises because of *I Maga'hågan Guåhan*'s declaration of a state of public health emergency to respond to the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic on Guam.
 - (1) Identified Areas. The DPW may exercise this hiring authority in the areas of engineering and construction, building permits and inspection, construction quality control, design

and analysis, project coordination and quality control, highway planning, highway programming, coordination and control, highway maintenance and construction, and building construction and facilities maintenance.

- (2) Special Rules for Hiring of Retired Employees. Any retiree hired pursuant to this Act *shall* fill a vacant position and *shall* be terminated upon the lifting of the declaration of a state of public health emergency. Such retirees *shall* be hired at Step 1 for the position in question and *shall not* receive sick and annual leave. Notwithstanding § 8121(a) of Article 1, Chapter 8, Title 4 GCA, retirees hired pursuant to this Section may continue to receive retirement benefits.
- (b) The DPW Director *shall* submit a report to *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* on July 1, 2025, and again thirty (30) days after the end of the current fiscal year, of the number of retired employees hired pursuant to this Section, the positions filled, the length of employment, the cost of said hiring, and the nature of the critical need that was filled.
- Section 13. Temporary Employment of Retired Government of Guam Employees by the Mayors Council of Guam. The Mayors Council of Guam (MCOG) may hire retired government of Guam employees when a critical need arises. Examples of a critical need may include staff shortages due to recruitment challenges, absence due to a long-term disability status which has been certified by a medical doctor, and military activation of MCOG employees. The MCOG may exercise this hiring authority provided its authorized budget for personnel is not exceeded. The retiree hired *shall* fill such a vacant position and shall be terminated when the incumbent returns from military service or absence. Said retirees *shall* be hired at a minimum of Step 1 for the position in question and *shall not* receive sick and annual leave. Notwithstanding § 8121(a) of Article 1, Chapter 8, Title 4 GCA, retirees hired temporarily pursuant to this Section may continue to receive retirement benefits. Any employee hired under this Section *shall only* be eligible to enroll in the Government of Guam Health Insurance Program as an active employee.

- 1 The MCOG Executive Director shall submit a report to I Liheslaturan Guåhan on July 1, 2025, and again
- 2 thirty (30) days after the end of the fiscal year, of the number of retired employees hired pursuant to this
- 3 Section, the positions filled, the length of employment, the cost of said hiring, and the nature of the critical
- 4 need that was filled.
- 5 Section 14. Temporary Employment or Detail, Absence Due to Military Service or Long-
- 6 **Term Disability.** Notwithstanding the provisions of § 4117 of Article 1, Chapter 4, Title 4 Guam Code
- 7 Annotated, in the event a classified employee will be absent from work in excess of thirty (30) consecutive
- 8 work days due to active military service or a long-term disability certified in writing by a medical doctor,
- 9 the appointing authority for an agency may temporarily assign or detail another employee to assume the
- 10 responsibilities of the absent employee. Such detail or assignment may be in effect for up to the same
- 11 number of days of the consecutive absence due to active military service or medical disability. The
- 12 appointing authority may also fill such vacancies by limited term appointment; any such appointment may
- be in effect for up to the same number of days of the consecutive absence due to active military service or
- 14 medical disability.
- 15 Section 15. Locum Tenens Exemption During the Absence of the Chief Medical Examiner.
- 16 The Office of Post-Mortem Examinations is exempt from the Government of Guam Procurement Law in
- 17 contracting for the professional services of a qualified medical examiner to be provided when the Chief
- 18 Medical Examiner is absent from work.
- 19 Section 16. Advance Payments for Medical Services. In order to expedite acceptance of
- 20 Medically Indigent Program (MIP) clients by facilities in California, Hawaii, or Manila for medical
- 21 treatment approved by the MIP, the Director of Public Health and Social Services may advance payments
- for said medical treatment, and may establish escrow accounts for immediate and advance payment of

1	medical treatment at those Joint Commission Accredited hospitals determined by the Director to be best
2	able to serve Medically Indigent Program clients.
3	Section 17. Transfer of Employees.
4	(a) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, and in recognition of personnel shortages in
5	certain areas, I Maga'hågan Guåhan is authorized to transfer employees during Fiscal Year 2025 within
6	or between any line department or agency of the government of Guam, except that:
7	(1) This Section shall not apply to any employee of the Legislative or Judicial
8	Branches, or any employee within the Mayors' Council of Guam and Village Mayors' Offices;
9	(2) The transfer of an employee <i>shall not</i> result in a loss of pay <i>or</i> salary;
10	(3) No employee shall be transferred if the employee has filed a viable grievance with
11	the Civil Service Commission for discrimination based on political affiliation, gender, or sexual
12	harassment, unless the employee consents to such transfer;
13	(4) Notwithstanding any other provision of law or regulation, no employee of an
14	autonomous agency may be transferred to a line department or agency;
15	(5) I Maga'hågan Guåhan shall transfer the funding authorized for that employee's
16	position from the transferor agency to the transferee agency, including the Guam Memorial Hospital
17	Authority, the Department of Public Health and Social Services, and the Guam Behavioral Health
18	and Wellness Center, unless the transfer is from a line agency to an autonomous agency;
19	(6) This Section <i>shall not</i> be used to transfer employees acting in good faith who report
20	or expose bad business practices, illegal activities, or inappropriate conduct by public officials; and
21	(7) No employee who has filed a whistleblower complaint as provided for in statute

shall be transferred, unless the employee consents to such transfer.

(b) I Maga'hågan Guåhan shall submit a report to the Speaker of I Liheslaturan Guåhan of the transfer of each employee pursuant to this authorization with the name and position of the employee being transferred, the line department or agency the employee is being transferred from, the line department or agency the employee is being transferred to, the time duration of the transfer, and whether the transfer is permanent, by the twentieth (20th) day after each month of the fiscal year.

- Section 18. Competitive Wage Act Employee Appeals Pay. Pursuant to the authority under § 6218.1 of Article 2, Chapter 6, Title 4, Guam Code Annotated, relative to allowing retroactive pay adjustments, all executive branch departments and agencies are hereby authorized to utilize their entity's operational budgets to make retroactive pay adjustments for employees whose appeals were adjudicated and affirmed by the Competitive Wage Act appeals process conducted by the Department of Administration; provided, that it does not negatively impact current operational needs. This authorization shall be applied retroactively to January 26, 2014 for affected employees.
- Section 19. Board and Commission Stipends. Any compensation or stipend owed to a board or commission member for attending a regular or special meeting in Fiscal Year 2025 *shall* be paid from appropriations in this Act by the department or agency responsible for the administrative support and operations of such board or commission. Board and commission members may elect to *not* receive said compensation. *I Maga'hågan Guåhan* may, by Executive Order, waive the payment of meeting stipends owed to any board or commission member.
- Notwithstanding any other provision of law, each member of the Guam Parole Board *shall* be compensated Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250) for every meeting the member attends. No member shall be compensated more than One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) per month, irrespective of the number of meetings that a member attends in any given month.

Section 20. Contracts. Positions in the classified and unclassified service of the government of Guam *shall not* be filled pursuant to a contractual arrangement, *except* as provided in this Section, for Fiscal Year 2025:

- (a) Subject to Chapter 5, Title 5 of the Guam Code Annotated, government of Guam departments and agencies may contract with independent contractors; *provided*, that no agency may contract for services customarily provided by employees in the classified service, *except* as provided by law.
- (b) Government of Guam departments and agencies that *do not* customarily obtain professional services, such as licensed health professionals, licensed architects, licensed engineers, legal services, actuarial services, and auditing services through an employee in the classified service in that department or agency may contract to obtain such services.
- (c) The Office of the Attorney General, the Public Defender Service Corporation, and the Alternate Public Defender are authorized to contract with attorneys as independent contractors to provide services in areas in which it is impracticable or impossible for the office to proceed. Such contracts *shall* be in accordance with the procurement laws of Guam. No such independent contractor hired pursuant to this Section may receive from the government of Guam any remuneration in any form other than in payment for the position into which such person is hired. The Office of the Attorney General, the Executive Director of the Public Defender Service Corporation, and the Executive Director of the Alternate Public Defender *shall* file a copy of every such contract with the Chief Procurement Officer and the Director of Administration together with a written certification stating why it is impracticable to handle the matter within the office as otherwise constituted.
- (d) This Section *shall not* apply to the Guam Department of Education, the University of Guam, the Guam Community College, and the Unified Judiciary of Guam when filling positions of

- 1 justices and judges *pro tem*, law clerks, and legal interns; the Department of Revenue and Taxation when
- 2 filling the position of legal counsel; *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*; the Guam Memorial Hospital Authority, the
- 3 Department of Public Health and Social Services, and the Guam Behavioral Health and Wellness Center
- 4 when filling positions of licensed health professionals.
- 5 (e) Any instrumentality of the government of Guam that fills any classified or unclassified
- 6 positions by contractual arrangement in accordance with this Section shall file a copy of every such
- 7 contract with the Chief Procurement Officer and the Director of Administration together with a written
- 8 certification stating why it is impracticable to handle the matter within the instrumentality as otherwise
- 9 constituted.

- 10 Section 21. Program Reporting Requirements for Employment, Employment Placement,
 - and Job Training Programs at the University of Guam, the Guam Community College, and the
- 12 **Guam Department of Labor.**
- 13 (a) The President of the University of Guam, the President of the Guam Community College,
- and the Director of the Guam Department of Labor shall transmit a report to I Maga'hågan Guåhan and
- 15 the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan no later* than June 30 of each year of the actual number of programs
- 16 completed and/or certificates issued for each employment, employment placement, and job training
- 17 program; and employment data for said program completed for the two (2) years following completion of
- their respective programs, to include salary levels, job location, or whether the job is in the same field as

 - Section 24. Payment of Civil Service Commission Settlements or Judgements and Decisions by the Judiciary of Guam. Any obligations of back pay owed to compensate employees by a judgment or by a settlement agreement action of the Civil Service Commission or judgement and decision of the Judiciary of Guam is hereby appropriated from the Fiscal Year 2025 budget of the respective agency to which such action is directed.
 - Section 25. Authorization to Utilize Lapsed Funds from Fiscal Year 2024. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, *I Maga'hågan Guåhan* is hereby authorized to recruit and hire public safety personnel for the Guam Police Department and the Department of Corrections, or nurses, public health personnel, and respiratory therapists for the Department of Public Health and Social Services and the Guam Memorial Hospital Authority using lapsed funds from Fiscal Year 2024; provided, that (a) notice is given to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* of all unaudited potential lapsed funds by agency, program, or other by October 30, 2025; and (b) notice is given to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* of the amount, source, and intended use of those lapsed funds, five (5) days prior to use.

1	Section 26. Prevention of Disproportionate Reductions in Allotments. The Department of
2	Administration and the Bureau of Budget and Management Research shall not disproportionately reduce

Within thirty (30) days following each fiscal quarter, the Superintendent of the Guam Department of Education (GDOE) *shall* provide to *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*, and post on the GDOE website, a consolidated expenditure report which *shall* include the authorized spending levels, encumbrances, and expenditures (quarterly and year-to-date) of GDOE, enumerated by school or division within the department. Such report *shall* also be transmitted, by hand-delivery or electronically, to each school principal.
 - **Section 29. Alignment of Hospital Rates and Fees.** Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the Guam Memorial Hospital Authority (GMHA) is authorized to formulate a fee and rate schedule of applicable hospital fees and rates. Upon the completion of a fee study, GMHA *shall* submit the adjusted fee and rate schedule to *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* by June 30, 2025. Nothing herein shall affect GMHA's authority to regularly adopt or increase fees.
 - Section 30. Re-employment of Former Classified Employees in Education, Health, and Public Safety. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, for Fiscal Year 2025, former classified teachers, nurses, and public safety first responders of the government of Guam who were in good standing at the time of resignation may be re-employed at *not less than* the salary they earned at their former

position if they apply for the same or comparable job in the same department regardless of the timespan that the employee left their position. The employee may waive this privilege.

- Section 31. Excess Annual Leave for Nurses, Employees Working in Nursing Services, and Peace Officers. Notwithstanding § 4109(c) of Chapter 4, Title 4, Guam Code Annotated, employees working in nursing services at the Guam Memorial Hospital Authority, nurses employed at the Department of Public Health and Social Services, and Peace Officers, as defined in § 51101(b), Chapter 51, Title 17, Guam Code Annotated, who have accumulated annual leave in excess of three hundred twenty (320) hours as of September 30, 2024, may carry over their excess and *shall* use the excess amount of leave, prior to retirement or termination from service. At the time of retirement or termination of service, that portion permitted to be credited to sick leave shall be so credited and the remainder of the excess leave, if any, *shall* be lost. Nothing herein *shall* allow lump sum compensation or retirement credit for annual leave in excess of three hundred twenty (320) hours. Nothing herein *shall* limit registered nurses from accruing leave in accordance with § 4109.1, Chapter 4, Title 4, Guam Code Annotated.
- **Section 32. Purchasing First Class or Business Class Airfare Prohibited.** Notwithstanding any other provision of law, rule, or regulation to the contrary, the government of Guam shall not purchase first class or business class airfare, *except* for elected officials on trips lasting four (4) hours or more.
- **Section 33. Authorization to Extend the Gas Tax Relief Act.** *Except* for liquid fuel used for commercial aviation purposes, all levy of excise taxes, automotive surcharges, and mass transit automotive surcharges on liquid fuel *shall* be reported but payments *shall* be waived for Fiscal Year 2025, ending September 30, 2025.

11	Section 3. Government of Guam Retirement Fund Rate of Contribution. In accordance			
12	with § 8137(e), Article 1, Chapter 8, Title 4 of the Guam Code Annotated, the government rate of			
13	contribution to the Retirement Fund throughout Fiscal Year 2025 shall be thirty two and thirty five			
14	hundredths percent (32.35%).			
15	Section 4. Autonomous Agency Revenues and Expenditures Reported to I Maga'hågan			
16	Guåhan and I Liheslaturan Guåhan. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, every autonomous			
17	and semi-autonomous agency or public corporation in the government of Guam shall report all revenues			
18	and expenditures for all funds under its purview and administration to I Maga'hågan Guåhan and the			
19	Speaker of <i>I Liheslaturan Guåhan</i> , in a Microsoft Excel electronic file and a written report, on a monthly			
20	basis and post the same on its website. Each monthly report shall be due no later than thirty (30) days			
21	after the end of each month.			
22	Section 5. Facilities Insurance Requirements. Every department and agency of the			

government of Guam through the Department of Administration shall only expend such sums as

necessary, from the department's or agency's appropriations for operations contained in this Act, for insurance of government-owned facilities built or repaired with Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) grant funds, where such insurance is required by FEMA.

- Section 6. Reporting Requirements for Non-Profit Organizations. All non-profit organizations that receive funds pursuant to this Act *shall* maintain financial records that accurately account for said funds and *shall* provide a budgetary breakdown by object category to the department *or* agency that oversees the appropriation. The non-profit organization *shall* be provided a copy of this Section by the department or agency overseeing such appropriation, but failure of the department or agency to fulfill this duty *shall not* prevent any non-profit organization from carrying out its responsibilities under this Section. The non-profit organization *shall* also provide to said department:
 - (a) A quarterly report describing its activities during the reporting period and the results it achieved *no later than* twenty (20) days after the end of each quarter;
 - (b) Notification of all procurement of equipment and services of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) or more prior to awarding the contract therefore;
 - (c) Access to the overseeing department's *or* agency's duly authorized representative, and government of Guam auditors to appropriate records for the purpose of audit and examination of books, documents, papers, and records of funds expended under the appropriation;
 - (d) Submission of a detailed inventory listing of each year's purchases, as certified by its certifying officer; and
 - (e) A final report to the overseeing department *or* agency for submission to *I Liheslaturan*Guåhan containing a full disclosure of all expenditures of funds appropriated by this Act

 no later than November 15, 2025, for Fiscal Year 2025. The overseeing department or

1	agency shall submit said report to I Liheslaturan Guåhan, in a Microsoft Excel electronic
2	file and a written report, and shall post the same on its website.
3	Section 7. Fund Reversions. <i>Unless</i> otherwise specified in this Act:
4	(a) General Fund Reversion. All unexpended or unencumbered appropriations made from

6	Fund on the last day of Fiscal Year 2025.
7	(b) Healthy Futures Fund Reversion. All unexpended or unencumbered appropriations
8	made from the Healthy Futures Fund by a GG1, purchase order, or contract pursuant to this Act shall
9	revert to the Healthy Futures Fund on the last day of Fiscal Year 2025.
10	(c) Guam Educational Facilities Fund Reversion. All unexpended or unencumbered
11	appropriations made from the Guam Educational Facilities Fund by a GG1, purchase order, or contract
12	pursuant to this Act shall revert to the Guam Educational Facilities Fund on the last day of Fiscal Year
13	2025.
14	(d) Guam Highway Fund Reversion. All unexpended <i>or</i> unencumbered appropriations made
15	from the Guam Highway Fund by a GG1, purchase order, or contract pursuant to this Act shall revert to
16	the Guam Highway Fund on the last day of Fiscal Year 2025.
17	Section 8. Transfer Authority of I Maga'hågan Guåhan. Full transfer authority is
18	authorized for I Maga'hågan Guåhan between Fiscal Year 2025 General Fund and Special Fund
19	Executive Branch appropriations of departments and agencies. This Section does not apply to
20	appropriations made to the Unified Judiciary of Guam and I Liheslaturan Guåhan.
21	Section 9. Uniform Allowances. Notwithstanding any provision of law, uniform allowances
22	authorized in this Act shall not be less than One Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$150.00) for the fiscal year and
23	shall be issued to the employees no later than the end of the first quarter of Fiscal Year 2025.

Section 10. Government Staffing Pattern.

- (a) No later than thirty (30) days after the end of each quarter of Fiscal Year 2025, every director, administrator, or head of a government of Guam agency, excluding line agencies, *shall* submit to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* in a Microsoft Excel file and written report, and post the same on the agency website, a current staffing pattern in the format of the Executive Branch Fiscal Year 2025 Budget Call as of the previous quarter's ending. The agencies required to submit are autonomous and semi-autonomous agencies, public corporations, the Mayors Council of Guam, and the Unified Judiciary of Guam. Said staffing pattern *shall* include, at minimum, the name of every current employee and his/her position title, most recent hire date, salary, increment costs and benefit costs, the funding source for his/her salary and benefits, and the gross salary and benefits paid for during the quarter.
- (b) No later than thirty (30) days after the end of each quarter of Fiscal Year 2025, the Director of the Department of Administration shall post the government-wide line agency staffing pattern on the designated budget website in a Microsoft Excel file and written report. The format of the report shall be the current staffing pattern in the format of the Executive Branch Fiscal Year 2025 Budget Call as of the previous quarter's ending. Said staffing pattern shall include, at minimum, the name of every current employee and his/her position title, most recent hire date, salary, increment costs and benefit costs, the funding source for his/her salary and benefits, and the gross salary and benefits paid for during the quarter.
- **Section 11. Funding Source.** The following departments are authorized to expend up to the level of revenues collected for their respective special revenue funds for Fiscal Year 2025 and unexpended carryovers in revolving funds authorized by law only for the purposes authorized by statute for those funds:

(a) All health insurance carriers for the government of Guam *shall* submit a monthly written report, and corresponding Microsoft Excel file of said report, aggregating the data relative to (1) enrollees, both subscribers and dependents, by active employee and retiree subscriber counts, by plan, by class, by groups, supported/paid by the General Fund, detailed by agency/department; and (2) enrollees, both subscribers and dependents, by active employee and retiree subscriber counts, by plan, by class, by groups, supported/paid by autonomous agencies of the government of Guam, detailed by autonomous agency.

For purposes of this Subsection, autonomous agencies *shall* include the Guam Power Authority, the Guam Waterworks Authority, the Port Authority of Guam, the A.B. Won Pat International Airport Authority, the Guam Housing Corporation, the Guam Economic Development Authority, the Government of Guam Retirement Fund, and the Guam Visitors Bureau.

The GPD, GFD, CQA and DOC *shall* submit a written report to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan no later than* twenty (20) days after the end of each quarter in Fiscal Year 2025 which *shall* include the amount of overtime owed to each employee at each respective agency, by fiscal year in which such overtime was incurred, by division, and by employee name, for the previous quarter.

- Section 17. Independent Contractors. The Office of I Maga'hågan Guåhan, the Office of I

 Sigundo Maga'låhen Guåhan, and the Guam State Clearinghouse may enter into agreements with

 independent contractors pursuant to Guam procurement laws.
 - Section 18. Authorization for Payment of Prior Years' Obligations. Appropriations made in this Act may be expended for the payment of prior years' obligations, provided it does not negatively impact the current operational needs of the department or agency requesting such prior years' payment, and that five (5) days prior to payment, written notice is given to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* with the total amount, funding source, and the prior years' obligation to be paid for by the department or agency.
 - Section 19. Department of Revenue and Taxation (DRT) Authorization to Utilize the Better Public Service Fund for Tax Collection. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the Department of Revenue and Taxation is hereby authorized to use its appropriation in this Act from the Better Public Service Fund for the purpose of tax collection.

Section 20. Funds Available to Guam Cancer Trust Fund.

- (a) Notwithstanding the provisions of 11 GCA, Chapter 26, § 26603(e)(2)(b), all funds available to the Guam Cancer Trust Fund in Fiscal Year 2025 are not subject to the seventy-five percent (75%) allocation limitation imposed by said Section, and may be expended for the purposes provided therein. All other provisions in 11 GCA, Chapter 26, § 26603(e)(2)(b), including the ten percent (10%) limitation on education and outreach, are not waived and continue to apply.
- (b) All funds of the Guam Cancer Trust Fund, including funds appropriated by this Act, are not subject to any transfer authority provided for in this Act or any other provision of law.
 - (c) The provisions of 11 GCA, Chapter 26, Article 6, § 26603(e)(6) are not waived.

 - (k) travel to testify on issues related to Guam's political status; or
 - (l) travel to testify at the invitation of the U.S. Congress.

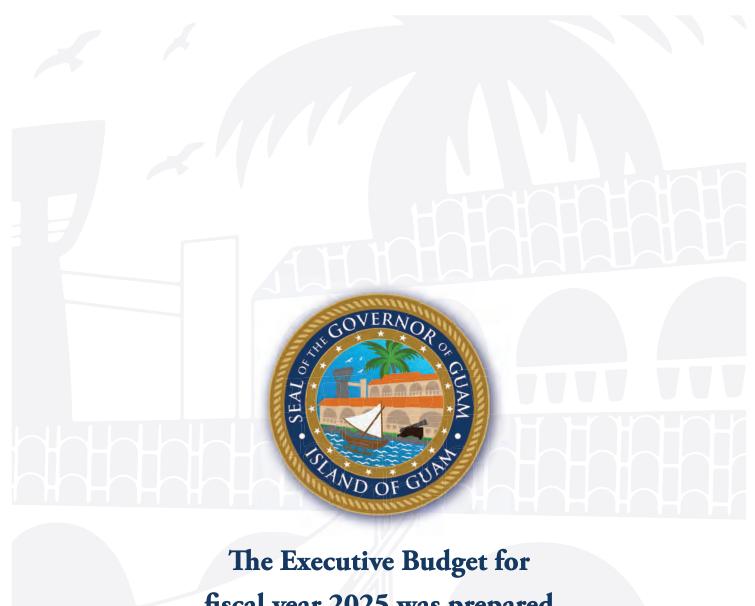
Section 23. Wireless Communications Restrictions.

(a) No government of Guam funds, regardless of source and including funds expended by autonomous agencies, *shall* be expended for the use of cellular telephones, cellular telephone services, and other wireless telephone services, unless the government of Guam will be reimbursed from federal funds or other grants. This Section *shall not* apply to *I Maga'hågan Guåhan*; *I Sigundo Maga'låhen Guåhan*; the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*; the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Guam; the Presiding Judge of the Superior Court of Guam; the Crisis Hotline Program of the Guam Behavioral Health and Wellness Center; law enforcement officials; on-call attorneys of the Office of the Attorney General and the Public Defender Service Corporation; on-call health professionals of the Guam Memorial Hospital Authority, the Guam Behavioral Health and Wellness Center, and the Department of Public Health and Social Services; village Mayors and Vice Mayors; Guam Fire Department and EMS officials; on-call

emergency management personnel; the Chief Medical Examiner; the Guam Election Commission; and the
Guam Visitors Bureau. The restrictions in this Section *shall not* apply to wireless internet services,
stationary (non-mobile) wireless telephone, and wireless voice over internet protocol (VOIP) services.

- (b) No appointing authority, manager, supervisor, or public officer in any branch of the government of Guam shall require or exert undue influence on any classified or unclassified employee of any branch of the government of Guam to maintain or utilize for employment-related duties, at such employee's personal expense, any form of wireless and/or internet communications, phone, tablet, or desktop or laptop computer. Nothing herein, however, *shall* be construed to prevent an employer from calling an employee at a wireless phone/radio if the employee designates such wireless phone/radio as a personal contact number. Nothing herein *shall* be construed as to prevent an employee, voluntarily and on his own accord, from using personal funds or resources for wireless telephone services. An employee in violation of this Subsection is subject to a fine not to exceed Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) for the first violation, and One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) for subsequent violations.
- **Section 24. Restriction on the Home Use of Government of Guam Vehicles.** Except as expressly permitted by § 1103(c), Chapter 1, Title 4 GCA, or any other law, no government of Guam owned, leased, or rented vehicle may be driven home by an employee *unless* such employee is on call as an emergency first responder.
- **Section 25. Annual Procurement Plan Requirement.** Pursuant to § 5010 of Chapter 5, Title 5, Guam Code Annotated, departments and agencies *shall* submit to the General Services Agency (GSA) a projected annual procurement plan at the start of each fiscal year. Plans *shall* include equipment, services, and supplies (e.g., vehicles, copiers, computers, heavy equipment, security, ground maintenance, janitorial and construction supplies, food supplies, etc.), by category, together with appropriate specifications or scope of work.

- 1 Section 26. Severability. If any provision of this Act or its application to any person or
- 2 circumstances is held invalid, the invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of this Act
- 3 which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of
- 4 this Act are severable.
